

Invitational Track Meet Set For Friday Night

The Heppner invitational track and field meet will be held at the rodeo field Friday starting at 7 o'clock and it is expected that 14 schools in this area will send teams.

Mac-Hi of Milton-Freewater, Arlington, Pilot Rock, Stanfield, Umatilla, Condon, Wheeler County, Weston, Ukiah and Heppner have reported in. Helix, St Joseph of Pendleton, Ione and Riverside are expected to report before Thursday. There will be seven track and six field events with between 100 and 150 boys taking part.

When asked which team looked the strongest, Heppner coach, Jim Mallon stated, "Hard to tell, but Umatilla looks strong." He also said, "The 220 yard dash is expected to be the top attraction along with the finals in the 100 yard dash."

Many of the top track men of the area will be seen. Spike Young of Helix is one of the top men to be watched. Pat Farley, who last weekend gathered in 48 points for the Arlington Honkers at Condon, will be in the pole vault; Roy Ames and Dan Green of Umatilla will be seen in the 220, 440 and high hurdles, and Green can run the hurdles in 16.0. Jim Steagall of Heppner has had very good times in the low hurdles, and Wells of Ukiah, who is a transfer from Hermiston, will be seen in the 880.

Tom Driscoll and Steagall are expected to take top honors in the broad jump.

The no-hit pitching of Tom Green let the Heppner ball team coast to a 4-0 win over the Riverside Pirates last Thursday at the rodeo grounds. The Mustang pitcher collected his second no-hit game of the year against the same team; the other game he has pitched in was a one-hit affair against Echo. Green gave the Pirates exactly four hits, no runs, and only four walks on a very windy day. The Heppner batmen could only get four runs on five hits, three by Green.

In the first inning, both the Pirates and the Mustangs went down in order. In the second the Pirates were again sent back to the bench. The Mustangs proceeded to score three runs in the inning as LeRoy Gardner walked and Tom Green connected with a double the first of his three hits of the day to score Gardner. Green then scored as Tom Glass singled him home from second. Another run was added in the inning when Jerry Davidson scored on Ladd Dick's sacrifice. Score at the end of the second was 3-0 in favor of Heppner.

For the rest of the game Green held the Pirates without any trouble letting only one man get as far as second base in the last four innings. The Mustangs added the final run of the game in the third when Gardner again walked and was driven by Green, to bring up the score to the final 4-0.

This Friday afternoon at 3:00 Heppner plays the Ione Cardinals at the rodeo grounds. Tom Green will go against John Swanson of Ione.

LIKE RAISINS IN YOUR BREAD?—WHEAT MEN TO TALK PROMOTION TIE

Do you like raisins in your bread? This will be one of several important topics for discussion by wheat growers at the annual spring meeting of the Morrow County Wheatgrowers Association to be held on Monday evening, April 25.

The meeting will be held at the Lexington Grange hall beginning at 8:00 p. m.

Whether to have or not to have raisins in your bread may seem like an unimportant matter, says N C Anderson, county agent. However, this is a project jointly being considered by the Oregon Wheat Growers League through its associated organization, Western Wheat Associates and the California Raisin Growers Association. This group has recently agreed to help finance the wheat program in Japan in return for promotion of raisins in bread. Detailed arrangements will be worked out soon.

While this raisin project will be reported on at the spring meeting, of special interest to many will be the colored slides and discussion given by Frank Tubbs, Adams wheat grower. He will relate his experiences of a trip to Tokyo, Hong Kong, India, Karachi, Rotterdam and various other side trips taken as a representative to the World's Agricultural Trade Fair held last fall in New Delhi. Mr Tubbs represented the U S Departments of Agriculture and Commerce, Western Wheat Associates and the Great Plains Wheat Marketing Development Association in charge of the wheat exhibit.

Six committees of the county association have brief but interesting reports to make of local and state concern. Among them will be red wheat imports gaining; public relations program underway; women promote essay contest; suggestions for appointment to Oregon Wheat Commission; position of new wheat bill; and 4-H-FFA exhibits being readied for junior spring show.

The 1960 county winner, Conservation Man of the Year, selected last Friday by chairman Tad Miller and committeemen Raymond Lundell and Bob Jensen will be presented during the evening. Emco, Inc local machinery dealer will present the traditional plaque to the winner.

Refreshments and door prizes are being planned as part of the program, which has been planned to be most informative and enjoyable, says N C Anderson. Wheatgrowers are urged to attend.

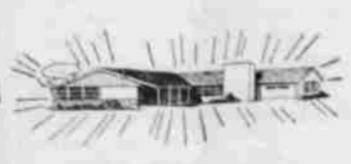
