duly. Also the size must be such that heat penetrates to the center of the jar relatively fast. We know that jars made for home canning meet all the above requirements. Some of the jars containing commercial products work fine—they have a flat sealing edge, are shaped correctly, and seem to withstand changes in temperature. Others are not able to withstand the shock. Some have narrow lips and they do not seal well. Unfortunately, we cannot tell which are going to be satisfactory. The trend seems to be toward better and better commercial jars. But until all such jars are made so they can be used in home canning, we must play it safe and recommend standard canning jars. Standard canning jars have the company name incorporated right in the glass. You know you're getting a jar designed for canning.

**Chats With Your Home Agent**

When I met with the women fair superintendents a few weeks ago the food superintendents asked if I wouldn't explain in my "Chats" the qualities of a "standard" canning jar.

Instructions in the fair premium book say that all jars must be clean to enter and canned in standard jars, except for jams and jellies which may be entered in any open mouthed glass; sealed.

The question always rises in canning about the use of commercial salad dressing jars instead of standard canning jars. This is the position extension takes:

There are only three conditions necessary to qualify a jar for satisfactory canning. It must be made so that it can be sealed with an airtight seal. It must withstand rapid temperature change. The third is size and shape—it must be shaped so that food may be taken out without affecting the shape un-
