

Mustangs Hold on To League Lead With Lone Win

The lone Cardinals came close to beating the Heppner Mustangs last Friday afternoon. Mustang pitcher Tom Green won his fourth straight game but not without trouble as the Heppner fielders made four errors. The Cardinals obtained two hits off Green, one which was good for two runs. John Swanson, Cardinal pitcher slapped a triple in the sixth to score two Cardinal runners to bring the Redbirds to within two runs of the Mustangs. Swanson tried to work a squeeze play hit but was out. In the seventh lone again got a runner to third but he was caught off base by the Mustang catcher on a wild pitch. This ended the two chances the lone team had of overcoming the Mustangs.

In the first inning the Cardinals took the lead the only time they were to have it as Melvin Martin scored on two Mustang errors and a fielders choice.

The Mustangs scored in the second when Tom Green came in on a wild pitch after he had doubled to lead off the inning. The score stood at 1-1 till the fifth inning when Swanson lost some of his control and walked Larry Green, hit Bob Davidson, Mike Healy then doubled both runners home. Ladd Dick moved Healy to second and Green walked. Tom Glass then singled to bring the score to its final figure of 5-3. The Cardinals threatened in the seventh but couldn't score.

The Heppner batters touched Swanson for only four hits (T Green, Healy, and Glass) lone managed two off Green (Hams, and Swanson). Winning pitcher, Tom Green struck out 12 and walked 2. Losing pitched, John Swanson struckout 11 and walked three and hit one. Batterys: Heppner, Green and Glass; lone: Swanson and Hams.

Heppner is now tied with Umattilla for the league lead. The Mustangs travel to Stanfield this Friday to battle with the Stafield Tigers. Saturday the Mustangs will take on the Condon Blue Devils at Condon.

COUNTY STOCKMEN TO SUPPORT LIVESTOCK RESEARCH PROJECT

Almost half of a \$2000 quota for livestock facilities at the Umattilla branch experiment station at Hermiston were subscribed at a meeting of the Morrow County Livestock Growers Association held last Friday evening. The general membership meeting was called to discuss the recently proposed livestock research project which if realized, would provide Morrow county with other neighboring counties first-hand research into livestock problems encountered by growers.

Twenty livestock growers attended the meeting and much interest was shown in the possibilities for such a station. Bill Barratt, Heppner, a member of the planning committee for the proposed research station, explained that facilities must be provided by livestock men of the area and that Morrow county had been given a quota of \$2000. The Livestock Association by action of the general membership agreed to provide \$500, the rest to be raised by individual contributions. Four livestock growers present contributed almost \$400. As a basis for collections it was agreed that the assessment fee would be 15 cents per head on cows and feedlot animals, 3 cents on ewes, 1 cent on feedlot lambs, \$1.00 on sows and 5 cents on market hogs. It was further agreed that if the quota was over subscribed, money will be pro-rated to contributors.

Problems outlined which might receive consideration at the station were shrink records on lambs, nutritional diseases and the place of straw in the livestock diet and feeding problems. Committees who will be asked to contact livestock growers for indicated interest are: Buttercreek area—W E Hughes, Raymond French, and Gerald Swaggart; Rhea Creek—Barton Clark; Eightmile—Bob Peterson; Willow Creek, Dick Wilkinson and Heppner—Floyd Jones.

In further business of the as-

sociation a resolution enacted by the Deschutes County Cattle-men's Association was approved and the secretary requested to inform the Oregon congressional delegation. The resolution called for an increase in funds for range development to come from B L M general receipts which have been published as exceeding expenditures for range improvement at a ration of seven to one.

The film "A look at Soviet Agriculture" concluded the meeting.
