Sewer System Talked

Plans and cost of a sewer system were presented to the members of the city council at a meeting Tuesday evening, May 4 by James Hagy and Donald Branton of The Dalles. They recommended the lagoon system of disposal for small towns and explained the way a lagoon worked. Two ordinances were adopted by the council. One was to increase the tax base in the amount of \$7,500 to employ a full time law enforcement officer and the other to extend the 10 mill serial levy for another ten

years. This money is to be used to improve the city water system and other city improvements. This is not an increase over the present levy but to extend it, as the former levy of 10 mills has expired. These will be voted on May 18 from 8 A. M. to 5 P. M.

The week of May 16 to 21 has been set as clean up week. Trucks will pick up trash May 20 and 21. Vacant lots will be burned by use of the fire truck. It was decided to put acoustic ceiling in the city hall and to paint the inside and outside.
