

Protested Game With Umatilla to Be Finished Here

A protested game on the part of the Heppner Mustangs prevented the Umatilla Vikings from winning league honors last Friday at Umatilla. The score was 5-1 in favor of the Vikings who have not yet won the ball game officially.

In the first inning the Mustangs were tagged for two runs on three hits and a wild pitch. The Vikings added another run in the third inning and the stage was set for the explosive fifth.

Mike Healy led off the inning with a single, stole second and third, and then got home on an error on the catcher, Davidson and L Green then struck out making two away. LeRoy Gardner was safe on first on an error and then Tom Glass hit a slow roller which went for a hit. Tom Green then came to bat. The Umatilla pitcher then ran up a 3 and 2 count on Green. On the next pitch the runners took off and the pitch was a ball. The Umatilla catcher then threw the ball to third and Gardner was called out. The play was protested because the 3 and 2 pitch was a ball.

Area Water Forecast Still Under Normal

Cool temperatures and below average rainfall in April have combined to delay agricultural operations in the Umatilla-Walla Walla area and have resulted in reductions of water supply forecasts that were already below average. Total water outlook is mostly "fair" to "poor" except for "near average" outlook for lands served from stored water supplies, according to a report released today by W T Frost, snow survey supervisor for U S Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service, Oregon Agricultural Experiment Station and State Engineer, State of Oregon.

Water content of the mountain snowpack is only slightly greater than half of the average for the 15 years, 1943-57, and is a little greater than last year, particularly at the highest stations.

The soil mantle in the mountain watersheds is well "primed" throughout the area. At Tillgate

station the electronic soil-moisture units indicate the water content of the 4-foot soil depth is up to 22 percent of capacity. At Battle Mountain station the soil is about 60 percent of capacity in wetness.

Cold Springs reservoir has been full since late March, while McKay reservoir now contains 54,400 acre feet compared with 69,500 acre feet at this date last year.

Forecasts of streamflow for the April-September period vary

from 71 percent of the average (1943-57) on McKay Creek to 83 percent average on the Umatilla and the Walla Walla.

A total of 22,000 acre feet are forecast to flow into McKay reservoir in the April-July period. Added to the 54,400 acre feet now in storage, the total of about 73,000 acre feet will have to be used carefully to provide sufficient water for all lands served.

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
