### EARLY DAY HEPPNER POWER SERVICE SHORT ON HOURS, STORY REVEALS

Local employees of Pacific Power & Light Company and their wives and husbands observed the 50th anniversary of the founding of the company at a dinner meeting of Pendleton district employees May 11 at the Pendleton Country Club.

D R McClung, president of PP&L, joined other company officials and local employees to note a half-century of electric service pioneering.

McClung told the gathering the company's progress was "a compliment to your personal dedication to good citizenship in your communities, as well as your performance in helping build Pacific Power's reputation for providing customers a high standard of electric service."

"You can take pride in your contributions toward achieving the high-level use of electric conveniences and comforts enjoyed by you and your neighbors," McClung said.

In discussing the growth of the company, McClung said a measure of the growth is reflected in the amounts of money PP&L has invested in new facilities to supply the power needs of its customers. He said the company has spent 283 million dollars for new construction in the past decade.

"For the Pendleton district including Heppner," McClung said, "the total outlay for electrical service facilities built in the past five years totals \$2,517,254."

"During the current year the company expects to build new facilities in the district costing another \$533,450," he added, "making more than three million dollars in six years."

McClung said the company's power development program will help assure a continued supply for customers in Oregon. "For future needs of the area there are proposals for additional Lewis River projects and the High Mountain Sheep project on the middle Snake River," he added.

Reviewing the early years of the electric industry in the Heppner area, McClung noted the town granted an electric franchise to H V Gates in 1892. Later that year Gates transferred his franchise to the Heppner Light and Water Company.

This company was incorporated on August 19, 1892, by Harry V Gates, Thomas W Ayers and James D Hamilton. A steam generating station was built in Heppner and service furnished early in the year 1893.

In 1911, two new boilers and a new steam engine were placed in operation and two 2,300-volt generators were installed. An 11,000-volt transmission was built from Heppner to Ione in 1915, and a distribution system was built at Lexington.

The electric properties of the Heppner Light and Water Company were sold in 1927 to the Sherman Electric Company. This company was purchased by Inland Power & Light Company in 1928, and these properties were acquired by Pacific Power & Light Company on July 18, 1930.

"In the early years, electric service usually was provided from dusk until 10 o'clock, or sometimes midnight," McClung observed. "If you wanted to read late you lit a coal-oil lamp and burned the well-known 'midnight oil.'"

At a special awards ceremony during the dinner, Fred Gimbel, local PP&L agent, accepted a silver safety merit award presented to him.

The Morrow County Gun Club annual spring shoot last Sunday was acclaimed as one of the most successful ever held and it attracted over 50 shooters, club officers report.

CCC's investment in price support loans and inventories totaled \$8.6 billion at the end of the 1959 fiscal year, the report shows. This is an increase of \$1.6 billion from the amount invested a year earlier. All CCC program operations combined, including the price support program for the fiscal year 1959, showed a net loss of just over \$1 billion, about \$150 million less than the net loss for the previous year.

Sales of E and H Savings Bonds in Morrow county in April were \$6,883 as compared with \$12,201 a year ago," according to a report received here by chairman Jack Bedford of the county savings bonds committee.

Though the sales were down for the month, total sales in Morrow county for the first four months this year are ahead of last year, \$62,974 to \$55,249.

Throughout the state, April sales were also down about 8 percent from a year ago, but are more than a quarter-million dollars ahead for the four months period.

### 50% of OSC Men And 10% of Women Self-Supporting

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Nearly half of the men students and about 10 percent of the women at Oregon State College are paying "their own way" through college without parental help, according to a summary compiled by the registrar's office.

Students are asked to check the percent of self-support on their registration forms.

Thirty percent of the coeds say they are at least half self-supporting and only about 1 out of 3 says she depends entirely on her parents for school expenses. Seventy-five percent of the men are at least half self-supporting, the summary showed.

It appears that almost any student who has the desire and the ability to go to college "can make it" if he or she is willing to make a real effort, college officials noted. A few students are working as many as 40 hours a week on the side from their studies and hundreds are holding down part-time jobs.

The college maintains an employment office as a service to students.
