

RAIN WASHES OUT SOME LITTLE LEAGUE GAMES; BRAVES LEADING

The Little League play has been stymied by the unpredictable weather with only 3 games completed instead of the 5 games that were scheduled. The Braves are now leading with a 2 and 0 record with the Indians not far behind with a 1 and 1 record.

In the game last Wednesday, the Giants scored in every inning but the 2nd to beat the Dodgers 11 to 6. The fielding and pitching was better than the score indicated. The Dodgers had 12 putouts and their pitcher, David Matheny, went all the way allowing 11 runs on 12 hits and 3 walks with 3 strikeouts. The Giants had 8 putouts and their pitcher Roger Leonnig, went the full game allowing 6 runs on 5 hits and 8 walks with 10 strikeouts.

On Thursday, the Braves and Indians played a fast tight 6-inning game with the Braves coming out on top 4-1. The Indians were up first leaving two men stranded with 3 striking out. The Braves followed with 3 up and down in order on 2 strike-outs and a put-out. Killenny got on with a single in the 2nd and went on to score the Indians only run. They were held scoreless and hitless in the last 4 innings by Brave pitcher, Jim Doherty. He allowed 1 run on 2 hits, 2 walks, and 5 strike-outs. The Braves in the 2nd inning, scored 3 runs on 1 hit and were held scoreless until the 5th when they got 1 run on 1 hit. Herb Davidson started pitching for the Indians with Butch Williams relieving him in the second. They allowed 4 runs on 2 hits, 5 walks, and 8 strike-outs. The Braves had 13 put-outs.

The Giants and Braves tangled Monday with the Braves victorious 6 to 1 in 5 innings. The Giants were up to bat first and were held scoreless until the 5th when they scored 1 run on 1 hit. Brave pitcher, Chris Labhart, went all the way allowing 1 run on 2 hits, 2 walks, and fanned 4. The fielding was excellent with 11 put-outs by the Braves. The Giants started Leonnig who was relieved in the 2nd by Don Munkers. They allowed 6 runs on 5 hits, 8 walks, and 8 strike-outs. The Giants had 4 put-outs.

The game Tuesday was called because of rain with Indians leading the Dodgers at the end of 3 innings 23 to 0. The Indians had 4 homers with Butch Williams getting 3 and Rauch 1. The game is called "no-game" and will be replayed on a Friday later in June. On this Friday the Dodgers and Braves will replay their game of last week that was called because of darkness.
