Chats With Your Home Agent

This week I'd like to tell you about the home economics program planned for Morrow county for the new extension year—beginning in September 1960.

Extension is an informal education program. As you will see from the projects listed we help you to learn skills in all fields of homemaking. Two new fields have been added to this year's program—family finance and family relations.

We have seven units (clubs) in the county who carry on these projects through the training of "project leaders" trained by the county agent.

Our special air this year is to organize several "nite extension units" in order to bring this program to young mothers who cannot attend day meetings.

If you are interested in organizing such a "nite unit" please contact me this summer so that we can have you organized before September 1.

Here's the monthly projects we are planning on:

September—"Rally Round The Barbecue" It will take just one or two good whiffs of the aroma of meat sizzling on an open grill to bring unit members rallying to the first meeting.

A barbecue will be prepared by the unit officers to give everyone an opportunity to get acquainted, select project leaders, and appoint hostesses for the year. Tips on barbecuing will be given.

October—"Food labels tell the inside story" Don't be a "guess" shopper! When shopping for canned foods, develop the habit of using the information on the label. The label is important because it serves as a window of the can.

This lesson will teach you some of the things that you learn from the label, and how they guide you to better selection.

November—"Better kitchen storage" Do you ever have trouble finding enough room to put things in your kitchen? Do you find yourself walking back and forth needlessly? Included in this lesson will be ideas for simple inexpensive ways to make dividers, step shelves, and other kitchen storage devices for organizing your kitchen for top efficiency. All these ideas will be practical for the home renter as well as the home owner.

December—"A free choice meeting" This is a meeting that can be devoted to a topic of your choice. Something in the making of holiday gifts, foods, decorations, etc. are suggested.

January—"Let's broil meat" Is the broiler the least used equipment on your stove? Do you shy away from broiling because it messes up your oven? . . . This lesson will show you new ideas in broiling, the broiling will help get variety into your meals, and that it is one of the best ways to save minerals, vitamins, and other food values. A complete broiler meal will be served with the meat.

February—"A look at a woman's world" This is the beginning of a study in family relations. What are the stages of a woman's life? How can she prepare for each stage? What are the problems—the satisfactions from each era of her life? This lesson will lay the foundation for further study into each part of the family cycle.

March—"Managing your money" Money isn't everything—goes the phrase but it sure is nice to have some around! . . . This lesson will set the stage for understanding the handling of money. We find that our wants are always apt to exceed our income. It will bring out a long look at money in your family life cycle to help you use

some educated foresight in looking ahead at what your money situation is apt to be at various stages in your lives. . . . This lesson will set the stage for further lessons on legal matters, wills and estates, social security, and preparation for widowhood.

April—"Soaps and detergents" What is the difference between a soap and a detergent? What size package of detergent is most economical to buy? What is the relative cost of liquid compared to granular? When a hang tag on a garment says "Wash in a mild soap," What do I use? Can I use a synthetic detergent if drainage is to a septic tank? How do I know how much detergent or soap to use? Can I switch brands of detergents or from soap to detergent from week to week? How can I test my water for hardness? These are some of the questions answered in this lesson.

May—"Good weight for good health" Most of the patent medicines and fancy devices for "slenderizing" on the market are harmless—but they're also worthless! Food faddists prosper on your fears! Let's take a sensible look at what is normal weight? How do I take off pounds? How do we put on pounds? How can I prepare meals for a growing family and still maintain my own good weight? . . . These questions will be answered. Menus and recipes for a unit luncheon will be given with this project.

Eye-Openers: Pointers on the "art of conversation" will be given as "eye-openers" at the beginning of each unit meeting. (This means you will have to be on time to get these little tips!)

These tips will include personal public relations, ways of being at ease and conversing in unusual situations, leads on conversation starters and how to avoid pit falls.

"Eye open" leaders will be

given special training for this before Sept 1.

Mass meetings: "Let's have a lamb"—Mass meetings held in cooperation with the Morrow County Cowbellies. You've probably had lamb chops or leg of lamb on occasion, but did you realize that there are more than a dozen cuts of lamb that are nutritious and tasty, and give a welcome change to everyday meals?

"More on mental health"—Mass meetings chaired by Mrs Velma Glass, Morrow county health nurse. We just scratched the surface on the subject of keeping our good mental health this past year. We now plan to carry on more study of this timely subject by mass meetings in various communities. Plans are to have a panel of a doctor, minister, and public health nurse discuss this subject.

WORKSHOPS: Dressmaking II—(Better Dress Workshops)

We plan to continue in our dressmaking cycle which we began in 1960. The purpose of dressmaking II is to teach principles of sewing that are important to handling fabrics of any fiber or blend and to using patterns with dressmaking details. This training will be given to project leaders who in turn will conduct workshops in their communities.

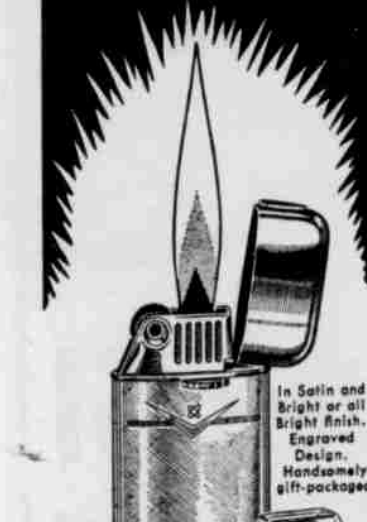
