

Braves Hold on To Lead in Little League Play

With only three games played this week, the League standings have not changed with the Braves leading the pack and the Indians in second.

No game was played last Wednesday because of rain but things got going again on Thursday when the Giants and Indians met in an exciting battle with the Indians getting the win 8 to 7. The Indians were up and down in order in the 1st inning and one run in each of the next three innings on 4 hits. Then in the 5th they unleashed 4 runs on 2 hits and 1 run on no hits in the 6th for their total 8 runs on 5 hits.

The Giants got their first run in the 1st inning on a walk and scored on a double by D Munkers. They were held scoreless until the 5th when 5 runs scored on 3 hits, 2 walks, and a sacrifice. In the 6th they got 1 run on no hits for 7 runs on 6 hits. Giants pitchers' D Munkers and R Leoning each pitched 3 innings with Munkers starting. They had 13 strikeouts and the fielders had 7 putouts. Starting for the Indians was B Williams with G Helker relieving in the 6th. They had a 14 strikeout record with the fielders putting out 4 men.

On Friday, the first of 3 make-up games was played with Braves outlasting the Dodgers in a wild 12 to 11 game. The Braves started things off with 4 runs on 1 hit, 4 walks, hit by a pitched ball. They went on to score 4 runs in the 2nd, 1 in the 3rd, 2 in the 4th, and 1 in the 5th for 12 runs on 8 hits, and 16 walks. The Dodgers came right back in the 1st to go ahead on 5 runs and went on to score 3 in the 2nd, 2 in the 3rd, and 1 run in the 5th for 11 runs on 5 hits and 7 walks. For the Braves, G Kreimeyer with J Doherty relieving in the 3rd. They had 7 strikeouts and the fielders had 8 putouts with 5 errors. The Dodgers used D Robinson all the way having 8 strikeouts and the fielders putting out 7 men with 3 errors.

On Tuesday, the Dodgers and Giants met in a close battle in the first 4 innings then the Giants exploded for 11 runs in the 5th to win 18 to 6. Dodger Pitchers' D Robinson, M Labhart, and L Richmond combined to strike out 10 and walk 12. The fielders put out 5 with 8 errors. The Giants went with pitcher R Leoning who struck out 9 and walked 6. The fielders put out 6 men.

OSC To Confer 1825 Degrees At Graduation

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—A total of 1825 degrees, including a record 332 master's degrees will be conferred June 6 by Oregon State College at its 81st annual commencement exercises.

The 1825 total is 175 more than a year ago and is the second largest graduating class in OSC history. Only larger group was the veteran-packed class of 1950 when 1968 degrees were conferred.

Fifty doctor's degrees will be conferred this year along with the 332 master's degrees, 2 professional engineering degrees, and about 1440 bachelor's degrees. The master's degree total is 58 more than ever before.

Baccalaureate service will be Sunday, June 5, with the Rev Daniel D Walker, minister of the First Methodist Church, Oakland, Calif., as speaker. Both baccalaureate and commencement will be held in the coliseum to provide maximum seating for parents, guests and the general public.

Baccalaureate service will begin at 11 a. m. and commencement exercises on Monday, June 6, at 10 a. m. Both programs will be telecast by KOAC-TV, Channel 7, and both will be carried over KOAC radio.

Two honorary doctor of laws degrees will be given this year. Recipients will be Frank H Bartholomew, president and general manager of United Press International, and Harry R Wellman, vice president of the University of California. Both attended OSC.

President A L Strand will address the graduating class following granting of degrees.

It's Spring—Time For Flowers!

Flowers are an economical means of beautifying your home. They may be grown easily and inexpensively in your own garden or found abundantly in God's Green Acre, without a price tag, in spring, summer, or fall.

Little or no money is required even when the unproductive winter months have depleted outside blooms, for it is possible to force barren branches from tree or shrub into flowers within doors, or use dried flowers or weeds.

The flower planting season is upon us now, so let's talk about what flowers we can plant that will make good flower arrangements this summer and fall.

Flowers fall into four types—

1. The line flower or spikes which form the outline for an arrangement. Any plant that has a narrow, straight look and a pointed tip. Plant such blooms as Gladiolus, snapdragons, stock, and delphiniums. Rose buds, iris leaves and grain heads are also classified as line flowers.

2. The mass flowers or the button type flower are put in an arrangement last to break the space into interesting patterns. Plant such flowers as zinnias, marigolds, roses, petunias, carnations and chrysanthemums. They may add accent and a point of focus that draws the eye of the viewer.

3. The background flower or filler flowers have fine texture and irregular outline that add lightness and airiness to the arrangement. Baby breath, perennials, statice, stevia, asparagus fern and love-in-a-mist. Background flowers may be used in arrangement if available, but they are not as essential as the spikes and buttons.

4. The form flower—these are the prima donnas of the flower world—flowers that can stand alone and need little background in an arrangement. They are flowers like the lilies, hydrangea, anthurums, etc. When you're planting your flowers be sure to prepare and fertilize your plot just as you do your garden soil. A pamphlet "Preparing and Fertilizing Garden Soil" is available at the county agent's office.
