commenced to be formulated days ago for the entire reconstruction of the South. And even now panels are publicly examining how the disaster was handled from the first instance on as a lesson for the future. Fortunately, at the head of the government's strong personality with a healthy moral sense, not given to politicking, a man of vision. And his term has just begun; he still has four and a half years ahead of him. If this sense of unity and cooperation can be maintained, then Chile can and will repeat what the world saw demonstrated in Germany. Then Chile can and will rise from its shreds, stronger and greater, solid in its foundation as a nation. Here is a chance to drain off the useless population infesting the slums of the capital city for the reconstruction of the south and to build up the South as a counter-balance to the oversized, overcentralized and lop-sided capital.

The help arriving from the outside has been no less overwhelming. It is like an earthquake of goodness. The human heart has opened its sluices and is literally flooding the land. To listen to all this on the radio brings tears to one's eyes. A fleet of airplanes from the outside is choking the landing capacity of Chile. From Argentina, Cuba, Peru, Bolivia, Venezuela, Mexico, The United States, Germany, Holland, etc. It is incredible, the help that is arriving in man and materials. Chile will have to be eternally grateful to the outside world for such a breathtaking demonstration of good will effective in action. It makes one proud to be a human being in spite of failures on summit sessions.

There has been one sour note and one note that has not been sounded at all. The name of Russia has not as yet appeared on any list of donations or even of messages of condolences. The first to arrive was that of Pope John. The other note; the Communist-led miners union of Lota is still in strike after a week of disaster. The miners want to return to work, but their leaders refuse to allow them. Let's hope that this gap in the united front of good will also has its proper effect upon the Communist sectors of Chile.

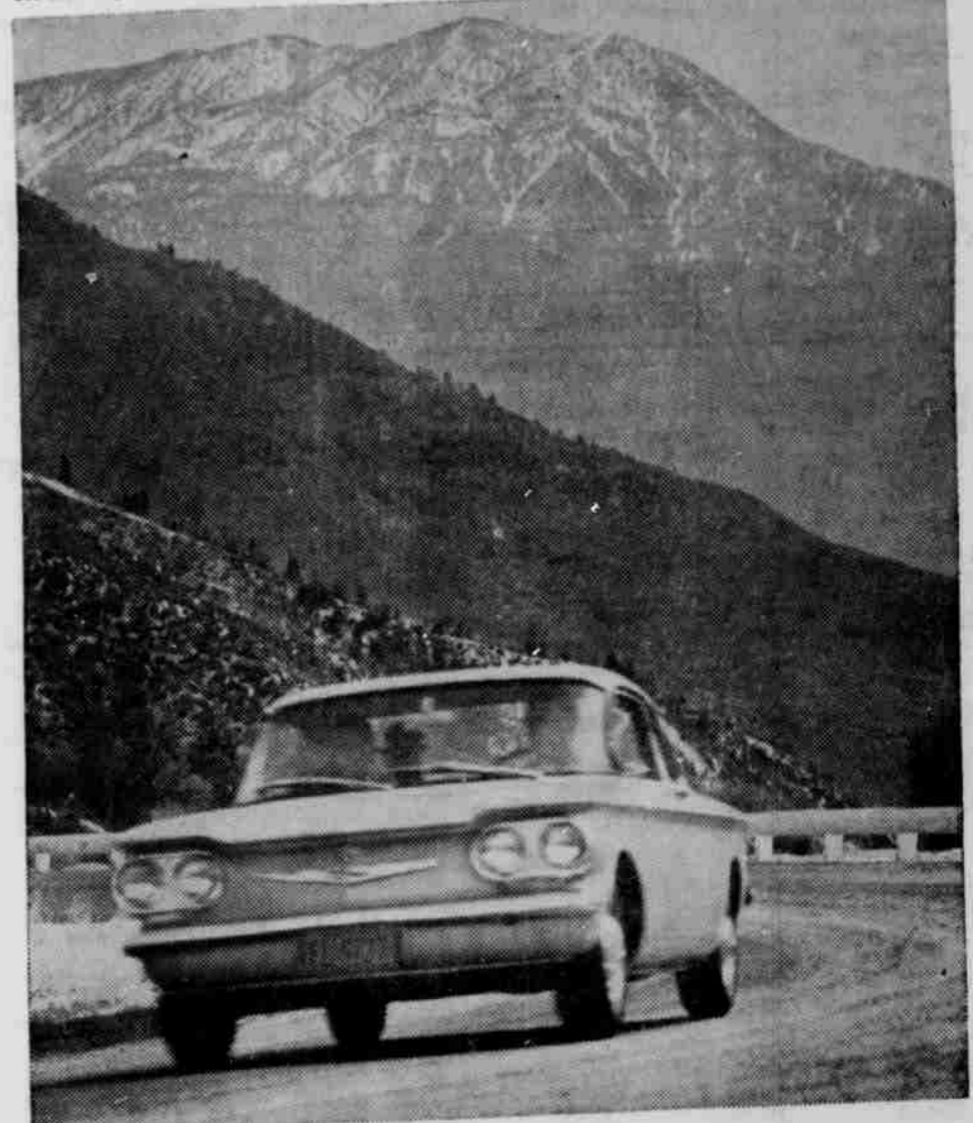
