



"CAPITOLITIS"

An apprehension that state agencies are getting boorish may be why Gov Mark O Hatfield has advanced plans to send panel groups made up of heads of state departments into selected regions of the state as a vaccine for the first mild stages of "capitolitis." A side product of the adventure is expected to be a better report from the people as to what kind of laws they expect the legislative system to produce.

The governor says he hopes to trim the operating agencies from 68 to 34, policy making boards and commissions from 83 to 37. The 20 licensing boards would be left at their present number.

A plan to move State Welfare Commission headquarters to Salem from Portland, to bring better management, was incorporated in a bill sponsored in 1959 Legislature by five Multnomah county legislators. The bill also would transfer the authority of execution to the governor, as it is in many other states.

NEW VETERAN PENSION
Widows and children of deceased veterans of World War II and the Korean War may be

eligible for pensions under a new federal law that goes into effect July 1.

The new law removes the requirement that such veterans must have had service-connected disabilities when they died.

Pensions now will be paid to unmarried widows with no children who have annual income less than \$1,800, or to unmarried widows with one or more children and with less than \$3,000 annual income.

TO HONOR HATFIELD
Speaking from Washington, D C, Monday State Republican chairman, Peter Gunnar reported that Governor Mark Hatfield had been assured "a place of at least equal prominence to the position of key voter in the Republican convention."

It is probable that Hatfield has been chosen to put the name of vice president Nixon before the convention or to introduce the GOP nominee to the convention.

Gunnar reported that he had been assured of Hatfield's convention role by "the highest authority" whom he did not identify. Gunnar has been attending meetings of the Republican National Committee.

CEMETERY RULING
A cemetery association can compel owners of cemetery lots to buy markers from the association, if the prices are reasonable, the Oregon Supreme Court said Thursday.

A suit was brought in Lane county by Theodore H Schaefer against the West Lawn Cemetery.

The decision, by justice William C Perry, affirmed former circuit judge Alfred T Goodwin, who now is on the Supreme Court.

The decision said Schaefer knew, when he purchased his lot, that he would have to buy a marker from the association. Having agreed to the arrangement he can't complain now, the court said.
