

Indians Lead Little League at Half Way Point

Ullman Hails Range Exchange

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Congressman Al Ullman (D-Ore.) expressed "great satisfaction" with the final approval by Congress of the authorization for exchange of the Boardman Bombing Range in Morrow county with the State of Oregon. He noted that this "gives full Congressional recognition to the industrial potential of the area and climaxes work by people in Morrow county and the rest of the state as well as here in Congress to secure release of this land for more economically sound use in accord with its increasing importance as a site for possible industrial development."

The exchange authorization was part of the military construction authorization bill passed by both House and Senate and sent to the President for signature. As enacted, it includes language proposed by Ullman to protect the taxpayers' interest in existing public domain holdings of the Federal government. The second district Congressman, who has been working for early release of the Boardman site since late 1958, was an active participant in negotiations between representatives of the State and Federal agencies which led finally to the legislation now given Congressional approval.

Ullman's statement also noted that he had secured firm assurances from the Navy Department that their needs for a new bombing range, scheduled to be located in Lake county, would not exceed the size of the present range. This had been a matter of considerable concern to people in that area. He had also gotten assurances that there will be no change in the present Navy policy of not using live ammunition in training operations and that full consideration will be given to rights of livestock growers currently utilizing grazing land in the Lake county area.

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Scottish Student To Visit Randall Martins in July

Miss Rhoda F Campbell, 25, IFYE exchangee from Scotland, will be visiting in Morrow county in July as the guest of Mr and Mrs Randall Martin, Heppner, according to Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agent.

Miss Campbell is a teacher in her home town of Kirkcubrightshire, Scotland; has lived most of her life on a sheep and cattle ranch with a portion of tillable acres put into grass, hay and oats.

Besides her parents, she has a brother, 23, and a sister, 16. They are of Presbyterian faith.

Sponsored by the Scottish association of young farmers' clubs, this Scottish lass indicates a special interest in all rural community affairs, particularly agriculture, education and youth handicrafts, needlework, amateur drama, and dancing indicate that she leads a busy life.

Her education consists of seven years in primary schools and five years in secondary school. She holds a three year non-graduate teacher's certificate from Moray Houst Training College.

Extension Unit Teaching Sewing

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Irrigation Pipe And Power Lines Poor Combination

Never up-end aluminum sprinkler pipe near a power line. Fred L Gimbel, local Pacific Power & Light Company Manager, has again reminded farm irrigation users.

Because aluminum is a conductor of electricity, contact between one of these long lengths of pipe and a power line can result in serious electric shock, the manager pointed out.

If it is necessary to up-end sprinkler pipe to shake out trash or debris, always look overhead first, and make sure you are standing well away from power lines, he cautioned.

The same precautions should be taken when installing television antennas and when moving cranes, derricks and other tall mobile equipment.

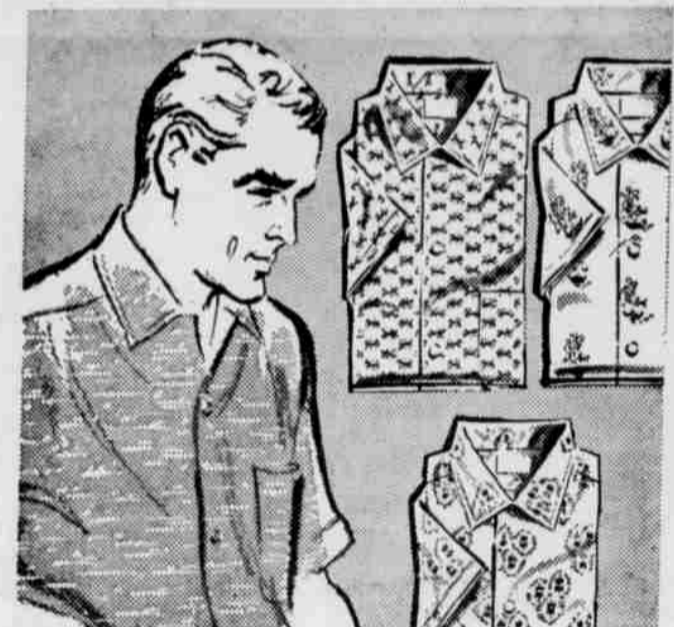
