

All-Star Games To End Season for Little League

Little League play is about finished for the summer with the climax coming on Friday, July 22 at Pendleton at 7:00 p m with the All-Stars from the four teams playing a Pendleton All-Star team in area playoffs. The winner will play the other Pendleton All-Star team on Saturday and the winner will go to Maupin the next weekend for district playoff.

Two games are left to play this week pitting the Giants against the Dodgers on Wednesday and the Braves going against the Indians on Thursday. The Giants are on top with a 6 and 2 record, the Indians in second place with 4 wins and 4 losses, Braves in third with 3 and 4 record, and the Dodgers with 2 wins and 5 losses.

A playoff between the first half winner and the second half winner was planned to end the season, but with the playoffs in Pendleton moved up, this will not be possible this year. Adding up the totals for the summer of play the Indians are in first place with 10 wins, 7 losses, 1 game to be played; the Braves in second with 9 wins, 7 losses, 1 game to be played; and 1 called game; the Giants in third with 9 wins, 8 losses, and 1 game to be played; and the Dodgers have 3 wins, 13 losses, and 1 game to be played.

The Indians continued their winning ways by trouncing the Giants 22 to 4 last Wednesday. The Indians picked up 1 run in the first and went on to score in every inning. The Giants were held scoreless until the third when they picked up 2 run and got 3 in the 4th to end their scoring. On Thursday the game between the Dodgers and Braves was called because of darkness. The Dodgers were leading. Then on Monday the Braves didn't have their nine players so had to forfeit the game to the Giants. The Braves used L Pettyjohn and played the game for practice with Braves winning 16 to 6.

Many Entries Seen For Special Events At Pendleton R-Up

Three new entries for the pole bending race of the Golden Round-Up, September 14-17, were announced today by Pat Davis, director in charge of non-competitive events.

Official entries for the specialized event have been received from the Territorial Riders of West Linn; the Coquille Riding Club of Coquille, and the Pendleton Mustangs.

The pole bending race, now in its second year as a Pendleton Round-Up attraction, will be moved off the track and into the center of the arena for the four days of the 1960 Golden Round-Up.

Eliminations will take place in the Round-Up arena on Monday and Tuesday of Round-Up week, with the winning riders competing, four at a time, each performance, Wednesday through Saturday.

Another feature attraction of the Golden Round-Up — celebrating 50 years of the wildest, wooliest rodeo in the West — is the free-for-all chariot race, now drawing entries from as far south as Burns.

According to Verne Terjeson, director of competitive events, an inquiry has just been received from the Burns Chariot Club, stating that they have four chariot teams and would like to enter the competition at Pendleton with their best teams.

The Burns Chariot Club has appeared in Prineville this year and is scheduled for appearances at Prairie City in August.

According to Terjeson, the chariots will race three at a time on the track in front of the north grandstand at the Round-Up grounds for 3/8 of a mile distance.

Double eliminations will be held for the four days of the Round-Up, Wednesday through Saturday.

Winners will receive a \$400 purse, plus entry fees, and one leg on a new Round-Up permanent possession trophy, which must be won three times to be retired.

To date, chariot race entries have been received from Walla Walla, Heppner, Ione, Hermiston, John Day, La Grande, Long Creek, and Pendleton.

EMPLOYMENT RECORD
An all-time record for employment in Oregon was reached in mid-June, the State Department of Employment reported Monday. The new figure was 730,900, just 4,100 over the previous record in August 1956.

At the same time, unemployment totaled 33,700, about 7 per cent more than the total a year ago.

The current employment total is 61,500 more than in May and 22,800 more than in June 1959.

Most of the increase is in farm jobs. There were healthy increases in food processing, construction, wood products, trade and service stations.
