## Chats With Your Home Agent

Are you still in the mood of eating out of doors? Why not try skewer cooking to give variety?

Skewer cookery is spectacular and always delights guests. If possible, let each person construct and grill his own kabob. It can be the meal's highlight. Make kabobs by alternating chunks of food on skewers. Use meat and vegetables which will cook at the same time. This may mean some vegetables, such as potatoes and onions, have to be partially cooked. Or give each vegetable its own skewer so you can remove each from the heat at the right time. Before broiling,

season with salt and pepper, and brush with barbecue sauce or melted butter and lemon juice. Chunks of meat will cook faster and more evenly if they are not crowded.

To serve point skewer down and slip the food onto plate, platter, or into a hot roll.

Here are some interesting kabob combinations:

—Franks, canned pineapple, or apple chunks, bacon squares

—Luncheon meat, pineapple, banana chunks

—Ground lamb shoulder, tomatoes, green pepper, onions

—Beef steak, mushrooms, sliced onions

—Luncheon meat, quartered tomatoes, small cooked onions

—Chicken livers, small bacon squares, mushrooms
