life specialist, reports that an estimated 500 children are killed in bike accidents each year with summer listed as the most dangerous season. Four out of five victims are under 15 years of age and violating rules of the road. Turning, riding the center of the road and refusal to yield the right-of-way are among leading violations.

Often, she notes, parents buy a youngster a bike, put him on it, and shout a few instructions as the child rides out of ear-shot. More training than this is needed, she continues.

Bicycle and automobiles are governed by the same rules of the highways and require some of the same learned skills. Children can also learn to appreciate that driving on the streets and highways is a privilege and not a right. Mrs Frasier suggests that bicycle riding privileges be revoked when riders violate rules. Here are other suggestions she offers.

Organize bicycle rider education program in your neighborhood or community. County extension offices can be helpful in organizing these programs and in securing educational films and other material.

Check bicycles regularly to see that they are in safe mechanical condition.

Parents who set a good example in their automobile driving habits are most effective teachers, she believes. It's difficult to impress a child with a respect for the law when parents try to "get by" with as many violations as they can.

Attitudes toward driver responsibility learned as a young cyclist will carry over in the future when the youngster is old enough to drive a car, says Mrs Frasier.
