WASHINGTON AND

"SMALL BUSINESS"

One of the most unusual measures before Congress is a bill that would levy a 1% tax on the advertising expenditures on television stations, with the funds being raised in this manner to promote the formation of, and subsidize the operation of, so-called educational TV stations.

Such a measure, if passed, would, of course, give government a strong financial interest in, and C. W. Harder, control over, a segment of the mass communication facilities of the nation. This, in turn, could lead to almost anything.

But it is interesting that although a government subsidy raised from taxes is considered in this TV matter, so far Congress has taken no action to remove the barriers against widespread operations of pay TV stations.

Yet, if the public, which theoretically owns the air waves, were to be given a choice of paying for programs it wishes to see, or watching those sponsored by advertisers, it appears that a great many startling revelations would come to light.

For one thing, it would probably destroy the present myth existing as to the hold TV programming has on the public.

In polls taken on this matter, when people were asked what type of programs they would be willing to pay for that are now currently being aired there were very few who said that

they would pay, except for certain big sporting events.

It seems quite obvious that the big TV networks, given a choice of collecting a tax from their advertisers to support educational TV stations, as opposed to permission for pay TV to get started in competition with them, would take the former as the lesser of two evils.

Yet, there seems to be a great fallacy. Why should anybody be taxed to provide other people with TV programming that presumably would be educational.

The nation's newspapers are highly educational. Yet nobody suggests taxing somebody or other to keep newspapers educating. Of course, no newspaper would accept a subsidy from a governmental bureau to begin with, but the offer has never been made either.

There seems entirely too much hue and cry over television, giving it a stature it perhaps does not deserve.

As it stands today, there is a high degree of monopoly control over the TV facilities. To tax this monopoly to subsidize a bureaucratic controlled monopoly facility, even if under the guise of educational, appears to be nothing more than compounding the situation.

On the other hand, unrestricted permission for pay TV, would not only open up new avenues for independent enterprise, but undoubtedly the public, released from viewing captivity dictated to by a few all powerful network monopolies, would be better served.

Ancient Rome in its crumbling days used the principle of taxation to provide free amusement for the people, and look how that situation ended up.

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NEW STATE BUILDING

The State Department of Finance and Administration has advertised for a site for a proposed three-story state building in Eugene.

The \$500,000 building will cost, will be borrowed from the State Industrial Accident Commission fund, and repaid by rentals of the departments which use the building.

The state wants a 100-foot square site within four or five blocks of the Lane County Courthouse.

The 1959 Legislature adopted a policy of building state structures in several cities in order to bring state agencies in those cities under one roof. Eugene is the first city in which such a building will be constructed to house various agencies there.

Legislators argued that this policy would save money and provide more service to the public. The three-story building will provide 22,000 square feet of floor space.
