Unusual Dressing For Summer Salads



Nothing can make a porch or garden luncheon quite so elegant as a fruit salad plate. With the addition of a salad dressing from the freezer, even a picnic plate will take on a party air.

A variety of elegant and delicious whipped cream dressings can be kept on hand for quick serving. Fill ice cube trays with the dressing and freeze. Remove cubes from freezer trays and wrap in transparent saran. Place wrapped cubes in plastic freezer bag, label and store in the freezer to use as desired. To serve, unwrap and defrost. It takes only a very few minutes. A recipe for a dressing of this type is given here. It is perfectly delicious and you will want to try it.

Avocado Dressing
 1 cup whipping cream, whipped
 1/2 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
 1/2 cup mashed avocado
 2 teaspoons grated orange rind
 2 tablespoons lemon juice

Blend ingredients together carefully. Freeze in ice cube tray. When frozen, wrap each cube in saran and place in freezer bag. When ready to serve, defrost and serve with or on fruit salad. This recipe makes about 2 1/2 cups dressing.

Chats With Your Home Agent

We have four brave 4-H girls in the county who accepted a challenge. They performed at the Morrow County Fair in Heppner this week. They are Marilyn Morgan, Jean Martin and Karen Lundell of Ione; and Jean Stockard of Heppner. These girls entered the bread baking, cake baking and wool sewing contest held at the fair Wednesday afternoon, August 24. Winners in each contest go to State Fair in Salem the first week of September.

Marilyn Morgan, 17, of Ione has become well known for her bread baking. Mrs E M Baker, Ione, is her 4-H leader. This is her third year she has entered the contest and each year she shows improvement. As a senior bread baker, Marilyn mixed enough dough, before a judge, Mrs Connie Telfason, Hermiston for one loaf of white bread and one pan of rolls. She was judged on measuring accuracy, dexterity in mixing and kneading, and neatness—personal and way of working. This accounted for 60 points. The finished bread and rolls were judged for appearance, texture and flavor—accounting for 40 points.

Jean Martin and Karen Lundell of Ione, members of Mrs Louis Carlson's club have had several years experience in the wool sewing contest. This competition is open only to girls who are enrolled in Clothing IV or V. Both girls worked before judge Mrs Russell McKennon of Pendleton. One piece of cloth was furnished to each girl along with thread, seam binding, sewing machine, iron, etc. They completed a small woolen hat which tested their ability in the making of seams and hems in wool. They were judged on accuracy of cutting, work habits, skill in sewing, pressing and the finished product.
