135 4-H members of Boardman and Irrigon are preparing to show their best at the North Morrow County Fair to be held in Boardman, September 1, 2 and 3, according to Esther Kirmis and Joe Hay, county extension agents.

4-H leaders are planning to meet at the fairgrounds on Sunday, August 28 at 1:00 p. m. for a potluck dinner after which they will clean up the fair buildings so that everything will be in readiness when the 4-H youngsters bring their exhibits on September 1.

4-H clothing girls will bring their dresses and exhibits to the Boardman Grange hall on Thursday, Sept. 1, between the hours of 9:00 a. m. and 11:00 a. m. Here they will be entered in the clerks' books by Mrs. Earl McQuaw, Boardman; Mrs. M. E. Hadwick and Mrs. F. J. Murtishaw, Irrigon; 4-H clothing leaders.

Mrs. Connie Tellefson, Hermiston, will judge all 4-H exhibits in clothing and foods.

A public style revue is planned at 8:00 p. m. that same evening at the grange hall when 4-H girls will model their dresses and skirts they made this year. Mrs. Nathan Thorpe, Boardman; Mrs. Charles Early and Mrs. Roy Davis, Irrigon; are members of the style revue committee. As an added attraction, states Miss Kirmis, women who took part in the Dressmaking I workshops held in the two towns this spring will also show their dresses.

Friday is 4-H foods day at the Boardman fair. Girls will bring in their cookies, muffins, cakes and bread at this time to be judged. 4-H leaders, Mrs. E. C. Daniels, Mrs. Delbert Carpenter, Boardman; Mrs. Perry Pummel and Mrs. Ward Honey, Irrigon; will act as food clerks.

Demonstrations are scheduled at the 4-H building on Friday of the fair. Shirley Jackson, Joyce Jackson, Gerry Swearington and Mary Gerberding, Irrigon; Elberta Carpenter, Anna Mae McQuaw and Sandra Thorpe, Boardman will demonstrate at 1:00 p. m.

A judging contest, open to all home economics girls is set for 3:00 p. m. that same day.

Knitting exhibits will appear for the first time at the North Morrow Fair, comments the county agent. Members of the Knit and Purl Knitting Club, Mrs. Lloyd Franke, Irrigon, leader, will each display three knitted articles they have completed this year. These will not be judged, only exhibited.

Livestock will be brought to the fair on September 1, at 9:00 a. m. announces Joe Hay, agricultural agent. They will be shown and judged on Friday morning of the celebration. Max Jones, Bob Smith, Irrigon; Bob Sicard and Roy Partlow, Boardman; will supervise these entries.

(Continued from Page 1) retention and application of the election laws." Appaling said he asked for a legal examination of the question of filling the office of coroner at the November general election.

The old law, requiring the election of a coroner, prevails until the new law becomes effective, Appaling explained. The new statute permits incumbent coroners to serve out their terms, so coroners elected in November will serve a four-year term, he said.

Since no candidates have been nominated, it will be up to the party central committees to select their candidates before the August 29 deadline, the Secretary said. Notifications were sent today to each county committee affected.

Independent candidates can also qualify by one of two methods, either by petition of registered voters or a nominating assembly. In either case the nominee must be certified by the August 29 deadline.
