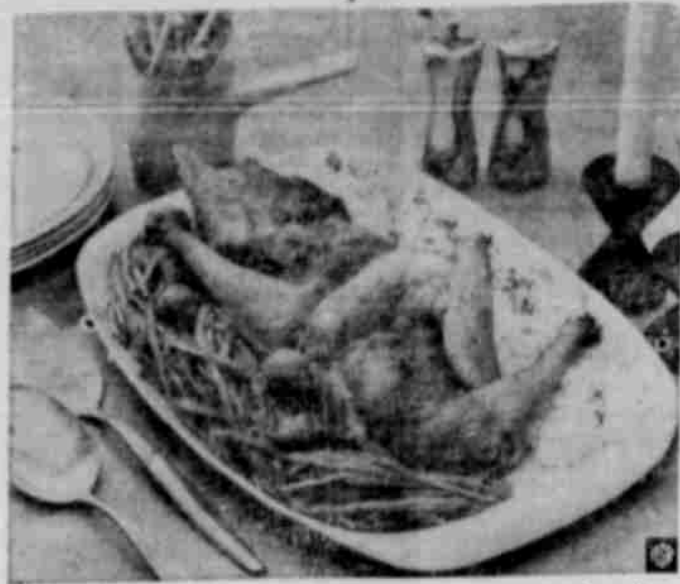

Chicken Kayos Calories

Herb-Broiled Chicken

1 broiler-fryer chicken, quartered
1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
Salt and pepper

Juice of 1/2 lemon
2 teaspoons melted butter or margarine
1/4 teaspoon each, basil and rosemary

Sprinkle chicken with monosodium glutamate, salt and pepper. Line broiler pan with aluminum foil. Turn temperature control to "broil" and place broiler pan 7 to 8 inches from heat. Place chicken, skin side down, on pan. Combine remaining ingredients; brush half the herb mixture over chicken. Broil 30 minutes. Turn chicken and brush with remaining mixture. Broil 15 to 20 minutes longer. Yield: 4 servings, 275 calories per serving.
