Ione Girl First Entrant in "Sew With Wool" Contest

Karen Lundell, 17, daughter of Mr and Mrs Raymond Lundell, Ione, is climaxing her nine years of 4-H club work by entering her black Frostmann's wool sheath dress in the Make It Yourself With Wool contest, according to Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agent.

The jewel necked dress with fitted bodice and three-quarter length sleeves is made of 100% Frostmann's wool. It's an eased sheath-type winter dress with a self belt, complete with a tafetta lining. This was Karen's 4-H project in Clothing V this year.

Karen, a graduate from Ione high school this spring, plans to attend the University of Oregon this fall. She plans to enter the wool contest in the Eugene district. She will be competing with approximately 1300 girls in 21 states for a designer's tour of Europe, college scholarships and many other awards. That is if she wins the district contest.

The district contest will be held in Pendleton, October 22 at the Vert clubroom when entrants in three divisions will compete by modeling their garments for qualified judges. Beginners division is for girls 13 years old and they compete for the division title only.

Junior division is for ages 14 through 17, and the senior division, 18 through 22 which may also include married girls.

Winners in the junior and senior divisions will compete at Portland in the state finals in December. State winners in those two divisions will go to Denver, Colorado in January to model their garments for the grand first prize of an air trip to Europe and many other awards.

Mrs Clint Lewis, Nolin is state director of the contest. Entrants will still be eligible until the time of the district style show, October 22, but she would like to have girls planning to participate get in touch with her as soon as possible.

According to Mrs Robert Hoskins, Ione, Morrow county wool contest chairman, there are two special requirements which must be met by all contestants in each age group.

First, only American loomed 100% wool fabric may be used in making the contest garment.

Second, the garment must be entirely the work of the contestant herself who must model her own suit, dress or ensemble at the district contest and any subsequent level.

Mrs Hoskins also said the sports outfit which was limited to district competition last year may go all the way to the national contest this year. It must be a complete outfit of an active sports type, not spectator sports apparel.

Another change noted by Mrs Hoskins is that a wool blouse is not required with a suit as previously announced. Many contestants live in warm climates where the wool blouse would be impractical so blouses may be purchased or made from any fabric.

Make It Yourself with Wool contest is sponsored jointly by Women's Auxiliary to National Wool Growers Association and the American Wool Council. It is the only national contest endorsed by National Association of Secondary School Principals which has approved it for the sixth year.

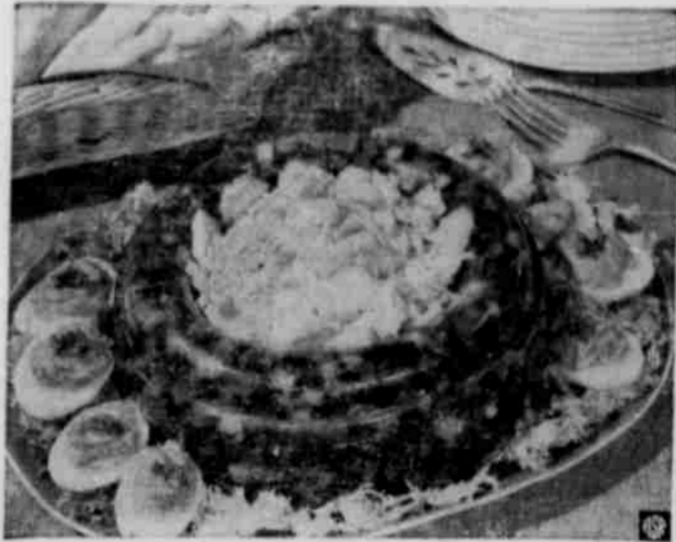

Triple Treat Salad Platter



Having a buffet supper soon? With the triple treat salad platter and crisp hot bread you need little else on the menu. A colorful vegetable-consomme ring mold surrounds chicken salad, with deviled eggs on fluffy greens finishing off the pretty platter. As the ring mold is tart and tangy keep the chicken salad simple. To make it for four to six use 2 cans (5 to 6 oz. each) boned chicken, sliced celery, mayonnaise and seasonings.

Ruby Ring With Chicken Salad
1 envelope unflavored gelatin 1/2 cup diced cucumber
1 can condensed consomme 1 can (1 lb.) diced beets
1/2 cup water Chicken salad
1 teaspoon salt Crisp salad greens
1 1/2 tablespoons cider vinegar Deviled eggs (optional)
1 small onion

Sprinkle gelatin over consomme and water in a saucepan. Place over low heat, stirring until gelatin is dissolved. Remove from heat and add salt and vinegar; chill until partially thickened. Fold in finely chopped onion, cucumber and drained beets. Pour into ring mold and chill until firm. Unmold on serving plate and fill center of ring with chicken salad. Garnish with salad greens and deviled eggs. Four to six servings.

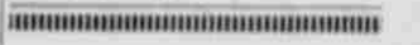
