

Mustangs Drop Opener 40 to 20; Tackle Umatilla

Heppner high Mustangs opened the 1960 football season at Elgin Saturday night and wound up on the bottom of the score 40 to 20.

Heppner was led by senior tailback Jim Steagall who scored two touchdowns, one conversion and passed for the other.

Elgin opened up fast and scored two quick touchdowns in the first period, and two more TD's in the second quarter.

In the first half Heppner showed its weaknesses on its defense, but in the second half saw many improvements.

Coach Dick Haworth stated, "In the second half the boys started to play football, but I won't comment on the first half."

At the close of the first half Elgin led 17 to 0.

The second half saw Heppner start to roll. Midway in the third period, Steagall went over from the five yard line. The conversion was also made by Steagall.

In the latter part of the quarter Heppner worked themselves to the 10 yard line when Steagall went back and flipped a pass to Larry Tibbles for the score. Neal Penland went up the middle for the PAT.

Early in the fourth period Steagall again scored, this time from the one yard line but Heppner failed to make the extra point.

There were no books kept on the game, so yardage figures are not known.

Heppner's starting lineup was ends, Tom Green and Dennis Dick; tackles, Ladd Dick and Charles Smallwood; guards, Merlin Hughes and Bill Monagle; center, Dick Springer; wingback, Larry Tibbles; blocking back, LeRoy Gardner; fullback, Neal Penland and tailback Jim Steagall.

Heppner will tangle with Umatilla Friday afternoon at Umatilla and the first home game will be September 23, against McEwen of Athena.

Price Outlook Given by OSC For '61 Crops

Prices for Oregon's wheat crop in 1961 will probably stay about the same as this year, but prices of barley, oats, and hay are likely to be lower next fall as Northwest and national supplies build up again.

That's the way it looks right now to Ray H Teal, extension seed marketing specialist at Oregon State College. Teal recently completed a survey of prices Oregon farmers might expect next year from crops planted this fall.

Little has happened to alter the market picture for next year's wheat crop, Teal said. The government price-support program will be the same for the 1961 crop as this year, with the national average support price at least \$1.78 a bushel.

Prospects are that the national carryover of wheat will hit another new record high next July. The 1960 crop is a little larger than last year's and stocks on hand July 1 reached a new high at one-and-one-third billion bushels.

Oregon oats and malting barley prices probably won't be as high next fall as this, but feed barley prices have a little better chance of holding up, Teal thinks. Oat prices are expected to stay above support levels this fall due to short supplies, since oats are the only grain with local and national supplies below the 1950-54 average.

New Student Week Starts Sept 18 At Oregon State

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—With New Student Week scheduled for September 18 to 24, Oregon State College will officially open its 93rd year as the state's oldest and largest state-supported institution of higher learning. New freshmen and transfer students receive special orientation and counseling during this period. Placement examinations are given in English, mathematics, speech and general aptitude.

row Hannechen barley of malting quality will probably sell at the highest prices in several years, since the crop of malting barley in Montana has been badly hurt this year by hot, dry weather.

But, these higher prices on oats and barley are likely to encourage larger plantings of these grains in the year ahead, Teal noted. This, coupled with lower prices on corn and milo that could increase use of these two feed grains, may start a new build-up of oat and barley stocks next year that would lead to lower prices.

Oddly as that hay prices will be no higher, and may be lower, in 1961, Teal also said. Oregon's hay crop this year is expected to be the largest since 1943, and another increase seems likely in the year ahead.

Registration for new and returning students will be Friday, September 23, and Saturday, September 24, until 3 p. m. Classes will start September 26.

Enrollment is expected to reach about 8,000 students to set a new record. Adequate housing is still available in dormitories, fraternities, sororities and rooming and apartment houses in Corvallis.

OSC's new School of Humanities and Social Sciences will be in operation for the first time this fall. The new school will offer some 40 minors in science and technology along with work in the school's 16 departments from art to history and from landscape architecture to speech.

Returning students will find several changes on campus. Two new wings of the Memorial Union, student union building, to house a three-floor bookstore and a 600-seat commons, will be completed. Construction has started on a five-floor addition to the one-year-old physics-chemistry building. And a new 300-student dormitory will be ready for occupancy. A new wing to the Student Health Service is also nearing completion.

To assure maximum use of classrooms, some 250 Saturday morning classes have been scheduled again this fall.

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
