

Many Entries Expected at Lone Flower Show

The lone Garden Club's annual flower show, which this year will be presented under the title, "For the Beauty of the Earth", will be held at the lone school cafeteria starting at 2 p m Sunday, September 25.

Schedules and a complete list of classes have been mailed out to most expected exhibitors at the show but any questions will be answered by Mrs Elbe Akers, general chairman; or Mrs Phil Emert, staging chairman.

Any amateur gardener is invited to exhibit at the show and there will be divisions for junior gardeners under 12 years of age. Entries will be received from 5 to 5:30 p m, Saturday and from 8 to 10:30 a m Sunday. The cafeteria will be closed from 11 to 12 Sunday morning for judging.

Ribbons will be given for first, second and third places and sweepstakes awards will be given in both adult and junior divisions to the exhibitors winning the greatest number of blue ribbons.

Twenty-eight classifications and many sub-headings are called for under the horticulture section. Added this year is a section for bloom cycle which will allow an exhibit of any one variety of flower showing three stages of bloom, from bud to full bloom stage, with foliage. There is a section for junior gardeners, a section for flower arrangements with song titles as themes, and a section for table settings for community organizations. This is subdivided into youth and adult organizations.

There will be a silver tea and program during the afternoon and the judges of the show will speak on grooming and care of flowers for showing and making arrangements.

The Wildmans have had many years experience in the newspaper business. He is a former publisher of a weekly paper in Arizona and spent some time on the Phoenix Republic-Gazette. Mr Wildman is a graduate of the University of Kansas, was

a personnel officer in World War II and a manpower management officer during the Korean war. Mrs Wildman was a fine arts student at the University of Kansas, is an accomplished pianist and organist and has done interior decorating. She has won prizes for landscape painting in oils and water colors at the Arizona State Fair.

The Wildmans have one son Larry who is a freshman at Heppner high school.

Mr Wildman is a member of the American Legion and a former grange member. In Arizona they were also interested in livestock and cotton farming. He has been active in Boy Scout work and Little League. They are members of the Christian church.

The Penlands have owned the Gazette-Times since July, 1951 coming here from Lebanon where he was business manager of the Lebanon Express. He has served as a member of the Heppner city council for nearly five years, is assistant fire chief and is a past-president of the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce. He is a past president of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association and the Oregon Admanagers. Mrs Penland has been active in many civic affairs, is a past president of the Heppner Soroptimist club and has headed several committees in that organization.

County Stock Growers Schedule Feeder Calf Sale

January 13 and 14 will be the dates for the annual meeting of the Morrow County Livestock Growers Association, reports N C Anderson, secretary of that organization. Dates were set at a recent meeting of the executive committee when arrangements for a Morrow county feeder calf sale were also completed.

Heading the program committee for this year's annual meeting is association vice chairman Ron Currin of Heppner. The two day meeting will be started with the annual "Bull Day" with speakers and business for the second day and the traditional banquet on Saturday evening. Heading the "Bull Day" committee will be co-chairmen Don Robinson and Frank Anderson. Other committees are entertainment, Raymond French and Ron Currin; nominating committee, Dick Wilkinson and Frank Anderson. New ideas for the annual meeting will be incorporated this year in order to make it of interest to all livestock growers.

Working with the Northwest Livestock Commission Company, the association decided to sponsor a Morrow county feeder calf day as a part of Northwestern's regular sale date on October 25. Northwestern will do special advertising for the sale and will run through all Morrow county cattle that day before other sales are made. The executive committee has asked that those planning to consign contact the secretary so that there might be an indication of the number to be sold.

A report was made on the recently held legislative committee on agriculture, regarding the proposed livestock research station at Hermiston. Those testifying at the hearing indicated that this area was becoming one where livestock feeding was growing rapidly and that such facilities would be helpful in developing this industry.

National Concern To Study Area

Six Eastern Oregon counties, members of the Mid-Columbia Planning Council, this week signed a contract with Ebasco Services, largest firm of engineering consultants in the United States, to conduct a survey of the counties to evaluate their economic development potentials and recommend a long range planning program.

The announcement of the signing of the contract was made by Morrow county Judge Oscar Peterson, chairman of the organization which includes Morrow, Umatilla, Gilliam, Sherman, Wasco and Hood River counties. Members of the organization are the county courts, port commissions and planning groups of the six counties.

Ebasco Services will be joined in the study by Thomas J Murray and Associates of Portland and Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield of Corvallis.

The study will begin immediately, according to Charles W Niederauer, Northwest regional manager for Ebasco Services.

Ebasco Services, with the aid of the state Department of Planning and Development, will make application for a federal grant to finance the study. The six counties organization has agreed to match the federal grant and the Department of Planning and Development has

agreed to appropriate some funds also. It is estimated that the preliminary study will cost about \$15,000.

The study to be made by Ebasco Services and the organization of the Mid-Columbia Planning Council were instigated because of the establishment of the Space Age Industrial Park near Boardman.

In a letter to Judge Peterson, Ebasco Services draws this broad outline of the study to be undertaken:

1. Assembly and broad analysis of regional economic and sociological data and information. Considered would be such growth factors as economic base, land use, public facilities, recreation and transportation, human and natural resources.
2. Outline of a long-range planning program (several decades) for the region, including suggested conservation and community improvement programs, to accomplish regional objectives within the economic means of the region.
3. Recommendations for the organization, administrative, and proposals for regulatory measures to assure success of the planning program.
4. Recommendations for public information program to gain region-wide support.
5. Presentation of a written report (50 copies) setting forth findings, conclusions, and recommendations.

The president of Ebasco Services, F C Gardner, said further in the letter to Judge Peterson: "The study as outlined above will provide a sound basis for future detailed planning and development of the region as a whole or any segment of it. A regional economic base study provides each community in the region with adequate evaluation of surrounding growth trends and influences. It is a method by which the individual community development programs can be co-ordinated to achieve the common objectives of the entire region."

"The scope of the work, outlined above is subject to your control at all times. It is understood that we will use to the fullest extent possible all reports, maps and statistical data now available or that may be prepared during the course of the study."

Chemical Fallow To Be discussed at Monday Meeting

"If you are interested in chemical summerfallow, you will certainly want to attend the meeting on this subject scheduled for Monday, September 26 from 2:00 to 4:00 p m at the fair annex building," says Joe Hay, county extension agent.

Such questions as can cheat grass and other weeds be controlled with a minimum of tillage; is nitrogen and soil moisture affected; what are the chemicals used; and what are the methods of application? Answers to these questions will be discussed along with information and results of the plots established throughout the Columbia Basin this past year.

Rex Warren, extension farm crops specialist, Oregon State College will be on hand to tell about the chemical summerfallow program. Representatives from several of the chemical companies have indicated that they will be on hand also to give some idea as to the availability of chemicals and the approximate cost.
