

Mustangs Drop Second Game to Umatilla 19 to 0

Coach Dick Haworth's 1960 grid squad suffered its second defeat in two starts in last Friday afternoon to the Umatilla Vikings 19 to 0.

In the first period Heppner recovered two fumbles and marched down within the ten yard line but were unable to score. The Mustangs defense held two of the Vikings drives in the first quarter.

In the second period the Vikings started a march that the Mustangs were unable to stop. Umatilla's touchdown came on a two yard drive by Ostrom and the extra point was not good. The TD climaxed a 40 yard drive in seven plays.

With less than a minute to go in the first half Ted Thonstad, a Viking receiver, got behind the Heppner defense, grabbed a pass and scampered 40 yards for the score. The PAT again failed.

The third quarter saw much of the first period over again. Heppner had a couple of chances to hit the scoring column but was just unable to make it. The Mustangs defense held the Umatilla team scoreless in that period, with both teams getting a drive started but also getting them stopped.

In the final quarter, Umatilla again hit the scoring columns when Dick Green swept the right side of the line for the final TD from three yards out. Ostrom went up the middle for the extra point.

Heppner was also able to get a score but it was called back. Jim Steagall hit Bruce Moyer on a pass and run play that covered 70 yards.

Umatilla out gained the Mustangs 185 yards to 123 yards. Steagall gained 71 yards on 20 tries for 35 yards a carry.

Heppner plays its first home game of the season Friday night at 8:00 at the Rodeo field. When they tangle with McEwen of Athena.

OSC Specialists Give Extensionists "Label" Training

Miss Barbara MacCandless and Miss Zelma Reigle, OSC consumer marketing specialists, gave special training to extension unit project leaders on "Labels Tell the Inside Story" at the Pine City school on Thursday, September 15, according to Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agent.

Getting her money's worth is the day to day responsibility of every good homemaker. As a consequence, extension unit women asked for information to guide them in the wise selection of canned and frozen foods.

Prior to the meeting the women were each given some home work. This consisted of a visit to several markets in the county to observe the labels on two brands of the same product. These included frozen beef pie, turkey pie, chicken pie, canned cream of chicken soup, frozen clam chowder, and canned spaghetti sauce.

They were also asked to use their "market eye" to find out prices, and cost per servings on such common foods as beef, ham, liver, bacon, chicken, cheese, bread, oranges, and orange juice, broccoli, lettuce, and spinach.

These were discussed at the meeting. Pointers were given on the kind of information a good descriptive label should include, and how to buy for your size of family.

"Labeling and packaging of food and other grocery products are two important steps between the field and the family table as food moves through the many essential processes and services", stated the two OSC specialists. "Manufacturers are convinced that good descriptive labels will supply the information you want, and are backing this conviction with action to give you such labels."
