phire. Crystals of corundum (ruby and sapphire) are being produced artificially with a selling price better suited to the average pocketbook than the genuine specimen would be. Asterism sometimes occurs, due to structural conditions, giving the appearance of a star in the gem stone. Because this is not a common occurrence, a star sapphire or ruby becomes a highly prized specimen. In concluding her talk on sapphires, Mrs. George Miller told where we could find these beautiful gem stones—Upper Burma, Ceylon, Siam, S Africa, and even the United States has some sources at Helena, Montana, Pennsylvania, and New York. The Lewis-ton River has also yielded some small sapphires of various colors. But think of the beauty of a sapphire the size of the one described in Ezekiel 1:26 and 10:1. In your Bible. It is also mentioned in other places—one of them being Rev. 21:19. What a thrill it is to learn of the beautiful things God has prepared for those who are faithful to Him.

Mr Vernon Warner of Portland visited his parents, Mr and Mrs Earl Warner.

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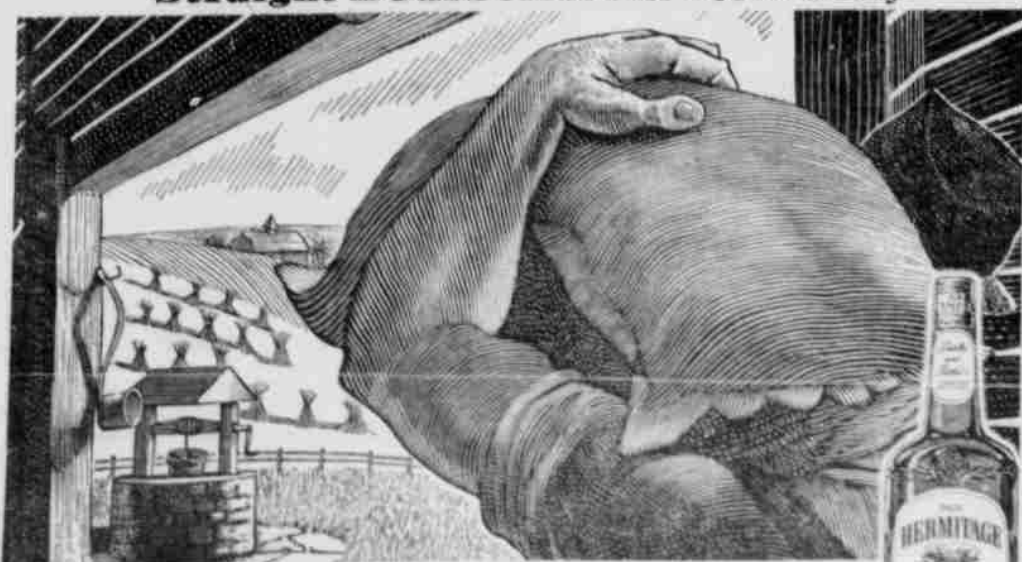
