

Fire Marks End Of Boardman's First Schoolhouse

Fire destroyed a home here belonging to Mr and Mrs D W Ewing last Friday about 3:30 p. m. Only some clothing and mattresses were saved in the blaze that gutted the home. Defective wiring was thought to be the cause of the fire, but officials were still investigating.

The burning of the building marks the end of the first schoolhouse in Boardman. The building was on the site of which is now the Ervin Flock farm, and school was held there in 1916. After the present school building was built in 1917, the school was bought by Paul Smith in 1918 and moved to its present location.
