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**Oregon Tourist Industry Shows Steady Increase**

Oregon highways carried the greatest number of tourists in the state's history during the 1960 travel year, Carl Jordan, director of the State Highway Department's Travel Information Division, revealed Friday.

Visitors to the state numbered 6,383,850 during 1960, as compared with 5,973,152 during the 1959 Centennial celebration.

Jordan attributed the gain to a combination of many factors, including the state's improved network of highways, the growing popularity of vacation travel in America and the increased out-of-state awareness of Oregon's vacation lures through national advertising.

Figures made available by the highway department's Traffic Engineering Division reveal that more cars, carrying a greater average number of visitors,

traveled greater distances this year than during any of the past several years.

Tourist income amounted to a near-record \$170 million during 1960, according to the traffic survey conducted in August. This figure compares favorably with the \$176 million received during 1959, since the Oregon Centennial celebration brought in unusual numbers of tourists who stayed longer and spent more money than during a normal vacation year, Jordan said.

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
