Business Men Urged To Employ Handicapped

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Maj. Gen. Melvin J. Maas, USMC, Ret., chairman of the President's committee on employment of the physically handicapped, urged small businessmen to hire handicapped workers.

He said that if each of the more than four million small businessmen in the nation hired "just one handicapped person in the next year" they would "open many opportunities for handicapped workers and help them to be assets rather than tax liabilities to their communities."

OSC Slates Sheep And Wool Field Day

New research in sheep breeding and management and current trends in marketing lamb and wool will highlight the second annual Sheep and Wool Field Day Oct. 28 at Oregon State College.

The field day, sponsored jointly by OSC and the Western Oregon Livestock Association, will open with registration at 8 a.m. in Withycombe Hall, according to chairman C. W. Fox, OSC animal husbandman.

Progress on control of white muscle disease in sheep through use of protein meals will be reported at the morning session by J. E. Oldfield, OSC animal scientist.

Encouraging results with purified microfine phenothiazine for control of internal parasites of sheep will be reviewed by Dr. S. E. Knap, OSC department of veterinary medicine.

Other morning discussions include: revision of USDA standard grades for lamb carcasses, R. E. Starr, Seattle; chain store requirement in buying lamb, Don Barnard, Portland meat buyer; and problems in marketing wool, Jack Gibson, Portland wool buyer.

Lamb imports and their effect on local markets will be discussed in an afternoon session by G. Burton Wood, head of the OSC department of agricultural economics who recently conferred with the U. S. Tariff Commission concerning imports.

Other speakers are John H. Landers and Dean W. Frischknecht, OSC extension livestock specialists; and S. H. Wu and S. W. Fox, OSC animal scientists. J. C. Miller, OSC dairy and animal husbandry department head, will moderate a panel discussion featuring main speakers.

OSC Withycombe Club will serve noon lunch. Following lunch, visitors will have an opportunity to tour sheep research facilities, the wool laboratory, and see a sheep grading demonstration.
