## Oregon 4-H Clubs Offer Driver Training

Parents who loan the family car to teenage sons and daughters can rest a little easier if youngsters are enrolled in a new 4-H automotive project.

Oregon State College extension service is inviting ninth and tenth graders who are learning to drive, and older teenage drivers, to sign up for a study-experience program on the automobile.

According to state and national records, youths under 20 years of age are involved in more than their share of accidents. They make up about seven percent of the automobile drivers but have about 12 per cent of the accidents. This spring, more than 10 per cent of Oregon drivers under 20 years of age were involved in accidents in the four months, March thru June.

The 4-H leaders point out that two million youth reach driving age each year and apply for driving permits. Of these, only a fourth receive any organized training in traffic safety.

Appreciation of highway safety and courtesy, a knowledge of traffic laws, and care and servicing of the automobile are project aims. In their club meetings, youths will also discuss money-saving subjects—how to shop for a new or used car, how to run it efficiently, and how to keep records. Older youth may find a career in the automotive industry through the project, notes Cal Monroe, acting state 4-H leader.

Activities include driving contests, economy runs, and demonstrations on safety, servicing and auto care. Youths may enroll in the project at county extension offices.

Volunteer adults, aided by state and county highway engineers, police, automotive experts and other qualified persons, will be asked to help lead clubs, says Monroe. He believes the 4-H automotive project will help supplement driver education courses given in many local high schools and in some communities will be the first supervised instruction ever offered.
