Apples, the king of fall fruits are now being featured at your favorite grocery store. Fresh apples are available year around in Oregon, but most of them come to market September through March.

When selecting a variety, consider expected use. Do you want apples for cooking, as a snack or both? Apples to eat out-of-hand are best free from blemishes, firm, juicy and of pleasing flavor.

You may want a more perfect apple to bake or to use in the fruit bowl than for pie or sauce. Apples for baking should hold their shape well when baked. Usually an apple with a slightly tart flavor is good for cooking. Again both small and large apples may be of good quality. Some of the best known fresh apple varieties are:

**JONATHAN**—Rich lively red over a straw background. Firm, tender, crisp and very aromatic. All purpose apple.

**DELICIOUS**—Predominantly a brilliant red with handsome shape terminating in five points. Largest single variety. They account for nearly a fourth of total apple crop with about two-thirds from Washington State. For out-of-hand eating, in salads and fruit bowl.

**GOLDEN DELICIOUS**—Bright yellow. Crisp and spicy. All-purpose and especially good for salads.

**WINE SAP**—Bright deep red, indistinct red stripes, marked with scattered whitish dots. Very firm and juicy, moderately crisp. A good keeper and all-purpose.

**ROME**—"The Beauty," large greenish yellow and red striped. Medium to large. Not the best for eating raw but excellent for baking since it holds its shape. Good for cooking and baking.

**McINTOSH**—"Big Apple" in the Northeast, second in national production. Bright red mixed with green. Slightly tart at first, becoming mild and sweet, juicy. All-purpose.
