After a formal reception by the Lord Mayor of Glasgow in the city chambers, every farm woman was "announced in" and then said, "How do you do, Milord Provoost," as she had been instructed.

For the first time in the history of the city, the Lord Provoost was a woman. She plans to visit the United States and will include the Pacific Northwest.

From Glasgow the group went to Manchester where they viewed the first Co-op established there in 1844.

The usual downpours of London had the tour members investing in brightly-colored raincoats which they used while going to and from the official civic receptions.

The homemakers tour tried out a new train. In use only two weeks, in their trip from London to Bristol, the morning of Sept. 21. As tour members disembarked at Bristol, England, flash bulbs started popping and reporters rushed up for interviews.

The tour group was divided into couples to stay in the homes of the Bristol Cooperatives. The Homemakers and their hosts had a chance to exchange ideas at the dance that evening. Teenage sons and daughters of the hosts asked many questions of the Americans about their teenagers.

Long trips took the farm women to see the Stonehenge, Salisbury Cathedral, Longleat House of the Marchioness of Bath, Bourton-on-the-Water, Stow-in-the-Wold, and past miles of farming areas. The women were in-

terested in comparing crops, methods of farming and animals with those back home.
