Gas Line Pipe Being Unloaded At Hinkle

The first sixteen carloads of pipe for construction of the Pacific Gas Transmission Company pipeline to carry natural gas from Alberta, Canada, to California were received at Hinkle Wednesday.

A representative of the Bechtel Corp., engineering managers for PGT construction, said Wednesday that unloading operations would begin this morning. Corey Martin, supervisor for unloading the pipe, is in Hermiston and a representative of the joint venture organization of Western Pipeline, Inc. of Austin, Tex. and J. P. Neill and Co., Inc. of Dallas had left Hermiston Wednesday to travel along the proposed line. This joint venture organization has received the bid for the 486 mile installation from the California line to Rosalia, Washington.

The company representative is following the line to determine where construction headquarters will be located.

An earlier news release from the Pacific Gas Transmission Company said that winter work on the line would consist of welding the pipe and laying the bed where water crossings, roads and highways and other barriers occur. The pipe is not expected to be laid in this area until April.

Actual laying of the pipe is to be done in four sections and Ione is the beginning of the section which will end at Rosalia, Wash., and the termination of the section which will begin at Bend.

The pipe received at Hinkle this week is the first of 500 carloads scheduled to arrive there over a period of time. Seven hundred carloads are to be delivered to Condon.

The contractors will bring certain specialists with them to the job but they expect to hire as many workmen as possible along the route of the line. PGT releases have stated.

Eight Positions To Be Filled

Petitions have been filed at the city hall for the position of mayor, city recorder, city treasurer and five councilmen, the city recorder announced recently.

Al Lamb is the only one running for mayor. W. C. Collins, the present mayor, has announced he would not run for re-election due to the press of private business.

Lamb has been manager of Morrow County Grain Growers since November, 1952, and a Heppner resident since March of 1953. He has served six years on the city council, is a past president of Heppner Lions Club and is active in the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce.

He is presently serving as county chairman of the Morrow County Democratic central committee and is district chairman of the Al Ullman campaign for re-election. Lamb came here from Tacoma, Wash., where he had been manager of a food processing plant.

Ted Smith has filed to succeed himself as city clerk, a position he has held for six years. La Verne Van Marter, Jr., is running for city treasurer again; he has filled the position for the past 12 years.

Five council members must be elected due to the resignation of both Robert Penland and Lowell Gribble during the past year. No appointment was made to fill the opening recently created by Penland's resignation but Conley Lanham was appointed to fill Gribble's place last spring and is running for election.

John Pfeiffer and Carl Spaulding are new candidates for council openings.

Allen Case, who has just finished one term, is running for re-election, and E. E. Gonty has served two terms and is up for re-election.

Lanham and Spaulding are filed for two year terms; all others are for four years.

Phil Blakney, present member with two years to run, will be the only carry-over.
