State Senator Loyd Key, Oregon chairman of the Farmers for Kennedy committee, today charged that recent statements by Vice President Nixon in popular eastern states indicates he is "talking one way to consumers and another way to farmers."

"When he speaks in agricultural areas, Nixon gives lip service to better conditions for farmers, but in his speech in New Jersey earlier this week he proved he is really giving out with double talk on the vital farm issues," Key stated.
