Unit Women Will Study "A Woman's World"

Close to 175 Morrow county women will take "A Look at a Woman's World" during November when they meet for their monthly extension unit meetings, says Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agent.

This lesson is the beginning of a study in family relations. A comparison will be made of the changing family of today with the family of 1890.

"We sometimes think children should be raised as they were in grandmother's day," comments Miss Kirmis, "but, would that kind of rearing prepare them for the world of today?"

The stages of the family life cycle will be considered: 1—family founding; 2—child bearing; 3—child rearing; 4—child launching; and 5—empty nest. The problems and satisfactions from each era of a woman's life will be studied.

"We find each stage has its beginning in the stages which have gone before and it's fulfillment in the future," continues the county agent. "We hope the women will realize that planning is most important before entering each stage."
