## A Return To Formality



Canned pear halves top this delicate burnt sugar cake in a simple circle arrangement. Cream cheese, softened with a little pear syrup, is fluted on with an icing decorator.

**Burnt Sugar Pear Pirouette**

Empty a package of Burnt Sugar Cake Mix into a large bowl. Cut off corner of packet of burnt sugar syrup and squeeze into measuring cup. Add enough water to make 1 cup syrup. Add syrup and 2 eggs to dry ingredients. Mix according to package directions. Pour batter into a well-greased and floured wedding cake layer pan, 10 inches in diameter by 1 1/2 to 2 inches deep. Bake in a preheated 350° F. oven for 40 minutes, or until cake tests done. Cool in pan for 10 minutes, then turn out on rack to cool. When cool, brush cake with syrup from a large can of pear halves.

Arrange pear halves in a spiral on top of cake and garnish with either hard sauce or softened cream cheese. Additional cream cheese sauce, made by thinning cream cheese with a little pear syrup, may be served on the side.

One of the best ways to add elegance to a dinner party is to plan a dessert that looks and tastes as though it took hours to prepare and great skill to cook.
