

## MUSTANGS END FOOTBALL SEASON WITH WIN OVER SHERMAN HIGH

Coach Dick Haworth's Heppner High Mustangs ended the 1960 football season by coming up with one of the major upsets of the season, dumping the Sherman High Huskies who were rated high in the state.

Heppner's tremendous defense won much praise from Coach Haworth as they allowed the Huskies only 96 yards to 232 for the Mustangs.

Heppner received the kickoff and marched to the Sherman 20 where the Huskies defense tightened and Sherman took control of the ball. The first period saw the Mustangs play hog with the ball as they only permitted the Sherman offensive team to get four plays.

In the second quarter action changed ends with the Heppner team getting in five offensive plays. During the first two periods Heppner was marching down the field but remained unable to push over the goal line.

At half time both teams had fought to a 0 to 0 tie.

The second half saw the fired up Mustangs come on the field with spirit and determination.

Sherman received the kickoff

and in four plays they were forced to punt. Heppner took the ball on their own 30 yard line and on the second play Dan Brosnan broke up the middle and scampered 65 yards for the winning touchdown. Jim Steagall went wide around right end for the extra point.

Late in the third period Sherman got a drive going and got to the Heppner 15 yard line only to have a penalty called and from there on they were unable to do anything.

In the fourth stanza Sherman was trying desperately to hit the scoring column by going to the air but was unsuccessful. In the last two minutes of the game Heppner had control of the ball and just ran the clock out.

In the first down department Heppner again came out on top with 10 to Sherman's 5.

This was the last high game for ten seniors who will not be back next year. They are: end, Tom Green; tackles, Tim Yackley, Charles Smallwood; guard, Bill Monagle; backs, Ron Gray, Dan Brosnan, Jim Steagall, Larry Tibbles, Robert Nichols and Neal Penland.

## Program Taped Here Will Cover Two States

"Think It Over," a new five-minute radio program, is being taped locally for distribution to radio stations covering the Oregon and Washington listening audience.

The Rev. John Rydgren, pastor of Hope and Valby Lutheran churches, was commissioned by The American Lutheran Church North Pacific District to develop the programs. Several tapes have already been distributed and radio station KOMO in Seattle has been airing the new religious dramatic show at 6:55 a.m. each Sunday morning.

Over \$1000 has been invested in equipment to make it possible for the tapes to be made at the Rydgren home. Mr. Rydgren, who has had extensive dramatic training, plays the part of all male characters. Other local people have taken other parts. Sound effects and music are used in the program, all of which are written by Rev. Rydgren.

Arrangements are being made for the program to be carried over stations in Portland, Spokane and the Tri-Cities as well as smaller towns in both states. Times for the program will vary with the station and will be announced as soon as determined.

Rev. Rydgren said that the location of making the tapes has been mentioned on each broadcast to date, though not included in the tape itself.

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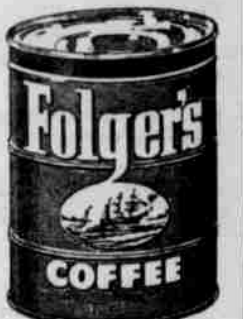
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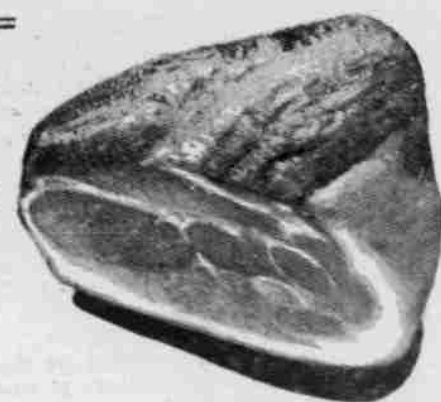
