Mrs. Robert Jepsen hosted the bridge club on Friday evening, 4 for three tables of bridge.

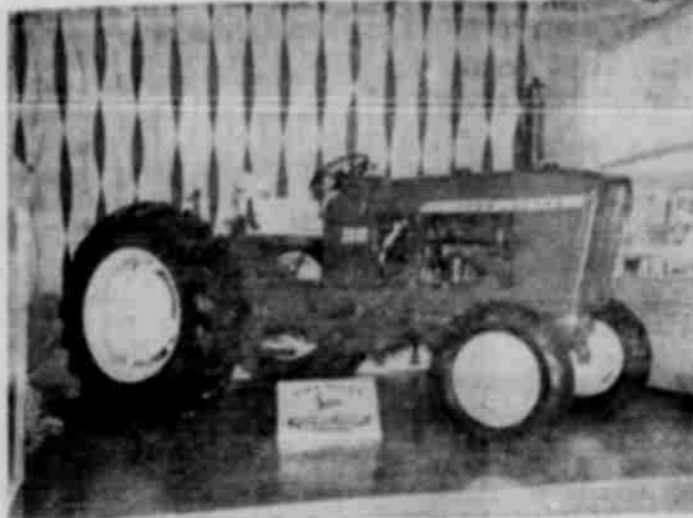

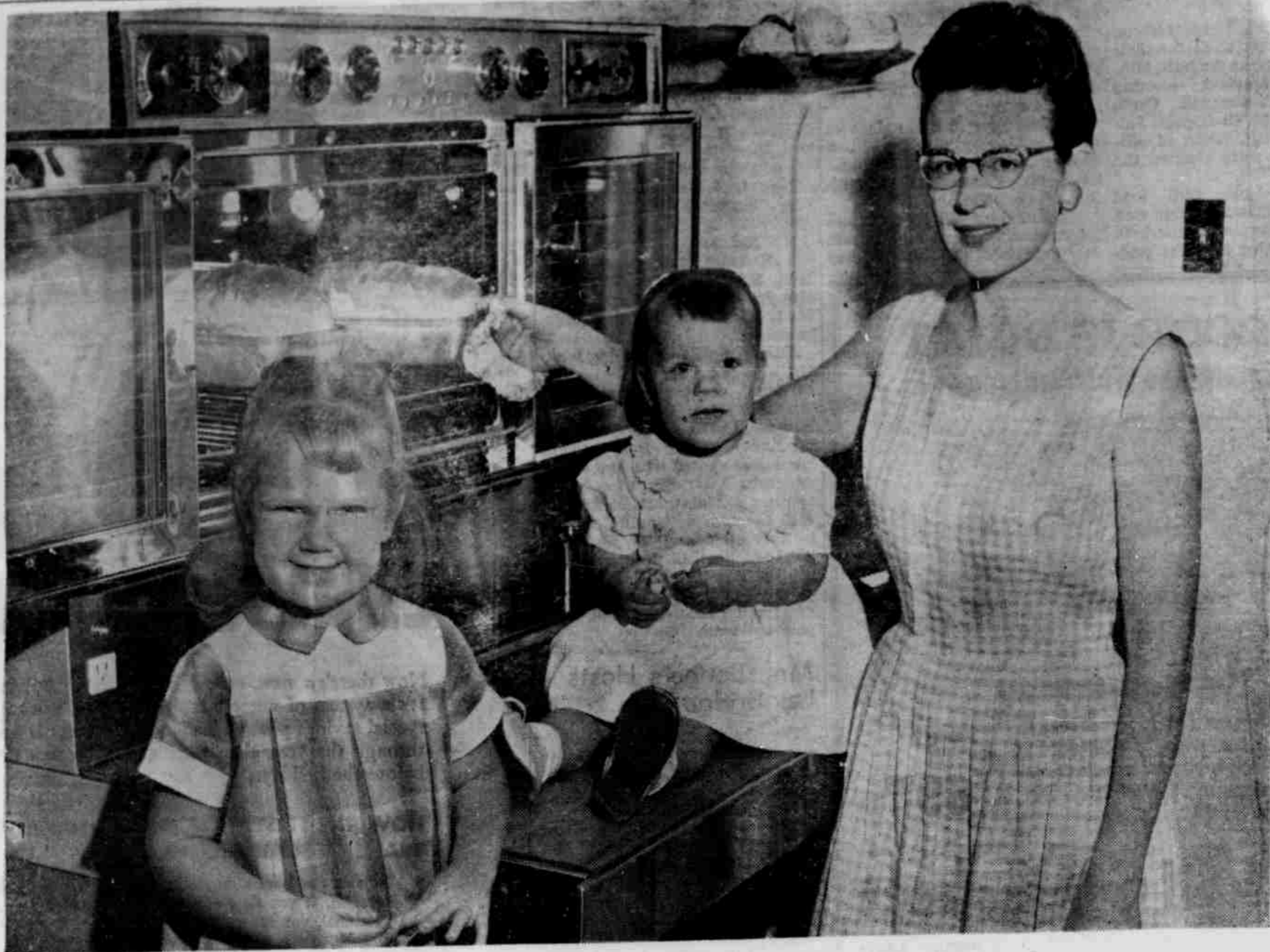
