

Cardinals Thump Bulls--Triangle Lake Next

The Ione High School Cardinals moved into the finals of the Oregon Class B 8-man football play-off by edging the strong Hereford Bulls in an exciting, coronary-provoking game in Ione on Veterans Day.

The final 39-32 score indicated the closeness of the contest that was marked by long runs by both teams.

Ione took the opening kick and scored in 12 plays. Wayne Hams went the last nine yards on a quarterback "keeper."

Hereford gave notice of a thrilling afternoon by getting their first touchdown in just eight plays. Rolland Duby, their shifty halfback, scored from two yards out.

Ione scored once more in the first half when Tom Martin ran over from the three and Hereford scored twice on a five-yard run by John Lemberger and a ten-yard pass from Duby to Larry Moore. The score at the half was 18 to 12.

In the second half, Ione tied the score on Jack Crum's 70-yard punt return but Hereford came back to go ahead 25 to 18 on Duby's three-yard drive. Wayne Hams sprinted 77 yards to score for Ione and Francis Rea's pass to John Swanson tied the score at 25-25.

As the pressure mounted, Hereford scored again on a pass from Duby to Moore. They were successful on the extra point try and went ahead 32 to 25.

On this day, the Cardinals were not to be denied. They took the kickoff and went 59 yards in seven plays, the last, a 16-yard pass from Hams to Swanson.

Rea's pass to Swanson was good for the extra point and the score was tied again.

Ione kicked the Bulls as the clock showed a little more than four minutes. Hereford could not move the ball and Ione took over on downs at the Hereford 17.

Crum smashed for 4, Martin gained 10 on two tries and Hams plunged into the end zone with the go-ahead touchdown and also made the extra point.

Hereford made a gallant effort to tie the score, but time ran out before they could dent the Ione goal.

Ione meets the Triangle Lake Lakers at Ione on Saturday, November 19, at 1:30 to decide the state championship.

Hurd Addresses Columbia Basin Co-op Annual Meet

The Columbia Basin Electric Cooperative, Inc., will hold its annual meeting Saturday at Memorial hall in Condon. Registration begins at 10:30 a.m. with the regular meeting called for 1 p.m.

On the agenda is a movie, "Columbia, River of Planned Destiny," at 11:00. Shown will be the complete development of the power, navigation and recreation facilities of the Columbia. A free luncheon will be served at 11:30.

Owen W. Hurd, Kennewick, Wash., will be the guest speaker. He will discuss plans for building the Nez Perce dam on the Snake river.

A treasurer's report will show the co-op has total assets of \$2,133,272.78 with a net margin for the year of \$12,470 as of June 30, 1960. The two million plus was invested in utility plant, consisting of transmission and distribution lines and other facilities.

Three members of the board of directors will be elected at this annual meeting. Guy Arbogast, Condon, is retiring from the board and the three year terms of Kenneth J. Smouse, Ione, and Henry Baker, Ione, have expired.

The nominating committee has placed the names of Smouse and Baker up for re-election. Others nominated are Roy Martin, Lexington; Ralph Eakin, Condon; Grant Wade, Condon; and Dick Wilkinson, Heppner. All elections are for three year terms.

Conference Reports Given

Decision to continue the Morrow County Committee on Children and Youth was made last night at a meeting of the group at the courthouse.

Originally formed at the request of Governor Hatfield, the Committee was first made up of those connected with county officials and the extension office, who deal with children. Later it was expanded to include others interested in the welfare of children.

It was brought out at last night's meeting that appointment by the court of a juvenile advisory council did not replace the original committee. The advisory council is to work more directly with the court and law enforcement agencies in making recommendations as to physical facilities necessary for care of youth in trouble in the county.

The committee is to study the problems of youth as they affect the young people and to coordinate programs of those organizations and agencies working directly with minors. Promotion of legislation which will make the lot of children easier is also part of the work of the committee.

Reports on recommendations coming out of the Governor's conference held recently in Salem were given by four of the Morrow county committee members who attended the three-day meeting.

Tax Collection Slower This Year

Tax collection in the county is running behind previous years, according to Sheriff C. J. D. Bauman. Less of the county taxpayers met the Nov. 15 deadline for their 1960-61 payments than in previous years.

Changes in assessed valuation and other factors have made a change in the top taxpayer for the county. Kinzua Enterprises, operators of the mills at Heppner and Kinzua, became the biggest taxpayer with a total property tax in the county of \$78,405.15. The tax on standing timber holdings in the county for the company showed an increase of 43 per cent over last year, a company spokesman said. In 1959-60, Heppner Pine Mills paid a tax of \$15,422.30 and Kinzua, who bought them out, paid a total of \$35,210.17.

Union Pacific, previously first, became the second largest taxpayer with a property tax of \$64,885. Company officials said Morrow county ranks seventh among the 19 Oregon counties to whom the Union Pacific will pay a total tax of \$1,338,996 this year. The railroad said it also paid \$343,000 in miscellaneous state taxes.

Morrow County Grain Growers was the third largest tax payer with a 1960-61 tax of \$25,077.50.

Expect 275 To Hear Speaker and Report

Morrow County Grain Growers will hold their thirtieth annual meeting Monday at the fair pavilion at Heppner, according to Al Lamb, manager.

Dr. Harold Holland, agricultural economics department, Oregon State College, will address the growers on agricultural adjustments.

The annual report will show a net profit for the closing year of approximately \$146,000. With a membership of over 400, the accumulated earnings since 1953 are in excess of one million dollars, Lamb said.

Three directors will be elected to three-year terms and seven associate directors will be named for terms of one year. Directors whose terms have expired and who have not chosen to run again are Lloyd Howton, Hermiston, and Vernon Munkers, Lexington. The term of Elmer Palmer, Heppner, has also expired. To fill the vacancies the nominating committee has named Elmer Palmer for re-election; E. Harvey Miller Jr., Lexington, and Walter Jacobs, Ione.

About 275 people are expected to attend the 6 p.m. dinner meeting. Women of the Inne Grange will serve the Morrow County 4-H reserve champion steer. Special prizes have been donated to add to the evening.

PP&L Tax Payment More Than \$15,000 In Morrow County

Pacific Power & Light Company reported Wednesday its net payment of property taxes in Morrow County for the current 1960-61 fiscal year will be \$15,812.36, an increase of 20.9 per cent over the property tax payment of a year ago.

Local Agent Fred Gimble said the increase also is reflected in the grand total of \$2,964,000 of net property taxes to be paid 27 Oregon counties before the November 15 deadline. He said the Oregon total represents a 13 percent increase over the total of \$2,626,153 paid Oregon counties a year ago.

The PP&L manager said the increase in the local property tax payment reflects additions of new electric installations to the local system to assure a high standard of services to customers in the district.

New School Board Member

Dick Wilkinson, Heppner, was appointed to the Morrow County School District No. 1 board Monday night following the resignation of Al Bunch, Heppner. Wilkinson was sworn in and took part in action of the board at their regular meeting.

Bunch resigned due to pressure of business and illness in the family. For his long service on previous school boards as well as the present board, a letter of appreciation was formally directed to be sent the resigning member.

Wilkinson will serve on the seven-man board until the next regular school election in May. Bunch was on a three-year term. Election next May will be for a one-year term to fill the unexpired portion.

Grace Schmidt, Heppner, was hired by the board to teach home economics in Heppner High School for the balance of the year.

Recommendations on board policy as presented to the board by advisory boards of the district and as presented by the administration were studied. Following a lengthy discussion they were tabled to be taken up at a special meeting which will be called to consider them.

In further action, the board gave its approval for the purchase of a strip of property including a house in Ione known as the Kincaid property, for \$7500. The land lies adjacent to the football field and will be used as additional school site.

Officers of the Morrow County Farm Bureau have announced that a meeting will be held Tuesday, Nov. 22, at the Bill Barratt home in Heppner. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m.

Tatone Re-elected Boardman Mayor

Joe Tatone, incumbent mayor of Boardman, was re-elected opposed in last week's election. There were several write-in votes cast. Sixty-eight of the 72 registered voters in the city cast their votes.

Results of four year terms on the city council, with three to be elected, were Dewey West, 45; Seth Russell, 47; Z. J. Gillespie, 49; W. C. Hendrix, 34. In the contest for city recorder-treasurer Ernael Mittelsdorf received 36 votes, and Mabel Allen, 31, for the post vacated by Bernice Kuhn.

Successful Year For Morrow County Rodeo

The 1960 Morrow County Rodeo association had one of its most successful years, according to officials of the event. Receipts for this year totaled \$8,754.83. This is several hundred dollars better than it has been for many years.

In commenting on the successful shows members of the Rodeo Committee said they would like to thank the Kinzua Corp., Heppner, for the saddle donated for the Morrow county amateur calf ropers; Hamley & Co., Pendleton, for the Northwest Bucking Championship saddle; the B.P.O.E., Heppner; the I.O.O.F. lodge, Heppner; Agri-Chem and Dave Hynds, whose substantial donations helped make the rodeo a money-maker this year.

Others mentioned were Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce for their outstanding job of ticket taking.

The fine co-operation of the Fair Board has been especially appreciated, the committee said.

They announced that new corals and chutes for the stock are now being built to insure an even better rodeo next year.

League meeting in Portland Dec. 1-3

Eighteen recommendations were made by the taxation and legislation committee, headed by Fredrick Martin, Ione. State Park Being Promoted For County

The possibility of a state park in south Morrow county was outlined by Alvin Wagenblast at the Monday Chamber of Commerce meeting. Wagenblast had attended a meeting in Salem last week of the State Parks Commission.

He said that county judges and commissioners from most of the counties in Oregon were present and that they reported state owned parks had greatly increased tourist business in their counties.

Governor Hatfield addressed the group and said that during the past year the tourist business in the state had been \$170 million dollars; an increase of 24 per cent over the previous year. The Governor also said that his office was promoting recreational areas in connection with the proposed Space Age Park at Boardman.

Some of the counties had many state parks, Wagenblast said; one as high as 26. Morrow county has none at present. He told those attending the Salem meeting that both the granges and the chamber of commerce had petitioned the Morrow court to take action to promote a state park on Chapin creek at the Pine Mill location.

He indicated that the State Parks Commission was impressed with the location and the need of a park in south Morrow and said that a meeting with commission personnel was expected to be arranged here in the near future.

Judge Oscar Peterson reported on a hearing at Salem of the State Highway Commission which he attended to promote improvement of the Spray road. He said the request was taken under consideration by the commission. Attending this meeting with the judge last week were Dick Wilkinson and Milton Biegl.

In other actions, the chamber voted to invite the winning Ione Cardinal football team as special guests of the chamber at the Town and Country banquet which will be held at the Catholic parish hall Nov. 28. Robert Van Houte was appointed to make the arrangements.

Harley Young, chairman of the street decorating committee, reported that Christmas decorations would be put up on the streets of Heppner the weekend after Thanksgiving.
