

Ione Wins State 8-Man Championship

Cardinals' Speed and Stamina Vanquish Valiant Foe

The Ione High School Cardinals stunned the powerful Triangle Lake Lakers with three first-period scoring thrusts, eased up during the second and third quarters, then came on with vengeance in the final stanza to score two more times to sink the Lakers 33 to 13 and win the Oregon State 8-man football championship Saturday in Ione.

According to their publicity, the Lakers' first team had given up only 13 points in the nine games played this year. The Cardinals appeared unimpressed as they took the opening kickoff and began to move.

Wayne Hams and Jack Crum combined to register one first down. After a 7-yard loss, Hams called on his ace, John Swan-

son and Crum, for a smoothly executed pass-lateral play that carried for 70 yards and a score on the winged heels of Crum. The try for point failed and Ione led 6 to 0.

The Lakers were unable to make a first down after receiving the kickoff and were forced to punt.

In six plays, Ione had its second score. Crum took a pitch-out, received key blocks from Swanson, Tom Martin, and Francis Rea, and set sail down the west sideline for 55 yards and paydirt. Two Lakers had a shot at the flying Cardinal but could not bring him down. Rea passed to Swanson for the extra point and Ione led 13 to 0.

Following the kickoff, Triangle Lake still couldn't dent the Ione defense and Ione took over on their own 40. Crum smashed the line for 8; then Hams hit Swanson with a short look-in pass and the big end shifted into high gear. Laker Gary Krause made a desperate grab on the 20 but found out too late that it's useless to tackle this Cardinal around the shoulders. Swanson shrugged him off and roared on

Sunday Night Storm Causes Some Damage

High winds of near tornado velocity caused scattered damage in South Morrow county Sunday night.

The building owned by L. E. Dick, Jr., on W. Linden Way was quite extensively damaged. A section of the front was torn loose and blown to the ground, exposing the warehouse part of the electric store where major electric appliances were kept.

The part knocked down was about 23 feet long by 16 feet high. TV wires were torn loose but power and telephone wires, which enter the building at the opposite corner, were not harmed.

The front was put on the building about five years ago. Dick said that early estimates of damages were close to \$1,000. It was covered by insurance.

Bricks were knocked off a chimney at the back of the Methodist church, a two foot locust tree was downed at the Claude Graham ranch home formerly occupied by the Smith family, tearing out power lines and barely missing the house, and many trees were reported felled in the mountains, some covering roads making it necessary for them to be removed before hunters and others could come out of the mountains.

Area Pioneer Dies; Services Sunday For Heatha Belle Leathers

Services for Heatha Belle Leathers, 94, were held Sunday at 2:00 p.m. at the Methodist church, the Rev. Charles Knox officiating. Mrs. Leathers died Friday at Vancouver, Washington.

She was born Oct. 7, 1866 in Anderson County, Kentucky, the daughter of Nancy Anne Searcy Hilton and William Levery Hilton. She spent her early years in Kentucky and married Nicholas Hanson Leathers Oct. 1, 1883. The family moved to Hardman with their three children, arriving March 13, 1892 where her husband homesteaded in the Eightmile district. Later they moved to Hardman and ran a hotel there at the time the town was a stage station.

Mr. Leathers and the family moved to Portland. Mr. Leathers passed away March 14, 1941. Mrs. Leathers had lived with a daughter, Mrs. Fannie Emery at Vancouver for the past nine years.

She was a member of the Methodist church for 79 years and was active in church affairs in her younger life.

Ten children were born to Mrs. Leathers and her husband, five of whom survive her. They are Mrs. Emery, Mrs. Joy Campbell, Vancouver; and Mrs. Juanita Carmichael, Lexington; two sons, Owen, Heppner; and Vernon of Gold Beach. Other survivors are nine grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren and one great-great-granddaughter.

Farm-City Week Banquet Features Varied Program

Farm-City Week, November 24-24 will be observed in Morrow County with the annual Farm-City Week banquet co-sponsored by the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce and Heppner Soil Conservation District, reports N. C. Anderson, county extension agent.

The banquet to be held Monday evening, Nov. 28, will be at the St. Patrick's parish hall in Heppner beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Speaker for the banquet is Robert Baum, administrative officer, state soil conservation committee, Corvallis. Baum will speak on the dependence of conservation of our national resources for a prosperous town and country.

Honored at the banquet will be members of the lone football team, their coaches and the lone principal, for winning the state eight man championship.

As a highlight this year Diane Kirsch, Condon, winner of the state conservation speech contest, will give the speech which won her honors last week at the annual meeting of the Oregon Association of Soil Conservation Districts. Miss Kirsch, a student at Condon high school will represent Oregon at the annual meeting at the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts to be held at Memphis, Tennessee in February, 1961.

Among recognitions to be made during the evening will be Conservation Man of the Year winner John Graves and the Heppner soil conservation district board who were second place winners in the state conservation contest of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company. Sid Chaffee representing the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company will make these presentations.

Special entertainment will be provided by numbers from the Heppner high school. Tickets for the banquet are on sale by supervisors of the Heppner Soil Conservation District, First National Bank, Bank of Eastern Oregon, Morrow County Grain Growers and the County Agent's office.

Oregon Banks Close Saturday Starting January 21

All banks in Oregon will begin closing Saturdays on Jan. 21, 1961. The announcement was made jointly by Harold A. Weiss, president of the Oregon Bankers Association and James H. Starnard, president of the Independent Bankers Association of Oregon.

The new five-day banking policy is in accordance with the prevailing practice of banks nationally, and is virtually universal in the Western states, the bankers said.

The Saturday closure will affect most of the 243 banking offices in the state. A few Oregon banking offices have been closed on Saturdays for several years.

"In addition to the added hours of banking service on Friday, such services as bank-by-mail, after hours depositories and drive-in banking facilities are available to make five-day banking adaptable to the requirements of customers," the announcement said.

"Many factors influenced the banks in their decision to adopt the five day week, but perhaps the main consideration in establishing the new schedule was the wishes of the bank employees. Under present conditions many families with both husband and wife employed find it impossible to spend their weekends together," the bank officials declared. "Then, too, a system of staggered days off during the week has made it difficult to maintain the continuity of good service customers should expect," they concluded.

Jack Bedford, manager of the Heppner branch of the First National Bank of Oregon, and Gene Pierce, manager of the Bank of Eastern Oregon, stated that their banks would observe the new hours along with other banks of the state. Both stated that any change in their present banking hours in the regular five days would be announced later as none had been decided on as yet.
