The accent was on double-duty patterns. The entire show featured pairs of fashions that could be sewed from the same pattern. Included were the switch-about separates called "Coupled in Cotton" modeled by Kathy Rea, Heppner; and Geraldine Morgan, Ione, which featured slim and flared skirts, two versions of a simple blouse, plus a sleeveless pop-on to wear with either costume.

"Dust for Beginners" showed by Margaret Green, Heppner,

and Leora Van Winkle, spotlighted separates with the cropped over-blouse in two looks from one pattern.
