

Mustangs Open With Win Over Sherman Huskies

High spirited Heppner high Mustangs opened the 1960-61 basketball season by splitting the weekend play, Friday night on the home court Coach Clint Agee's cage squad dumped the Sherman high Huskies 43-36. Saturday night, on the Moro maple, Sherman came on with a fourth quarter rally that the Mustangs could not stop and the Huskies came out on the top of the scoring 36-32.

Both nights defensive play dominated the game. Friday night there was 3:12 left in the first period when Bruce Moyer broke the ice for the first score of the game.

Friday night speedy Ron Gray led his Heppner teammates to their victory by coming up with 17 points. The first period of play was all defensive with both teams scoring for a total of only nine points. In the second stanza things broke loose and the Sherman high squad went to work. Little guard, Jim Duncan, got things rolling by coming up with six points by using a fast break. Heppner could not do much with the Sherman tall defensive but managed to come up with seven more points only to fall behind at the end of the first half 17-12.

After a half time rest, the Heppner hoop team came out and dominated the entire second half. In the third quarter Heppner was again led by Gray and Moyer who were hitting from the outside. The Huskies were unable to stop this play. Late in the period Sherman got hit hard when Jim Duncan went out on fouls. In the final stanza of the game center Tom Green got the range to aid the Heppner team out and came up with six points. Halfway in the last period things quieted down with neither team hitting the basket. Again in the last two minutes the Sherman team put off a last rally that Heppner stopped almost before it got going.

Saturday night Sherman came on in the fourth quarter to pull from behind to win 36-32.

The first half of play was again really slow with Heppner leading all the way 7-2. In the second stanza Heppner increased

its lead more to make the score 19-9.

In the second half Heppner started their road down by only hitting three of 27 field goals, and getting the rest of the Mustangs points at the charity line. Tom Green led the team with 10 points and Gray was close behind with 8. For the weekend Gray had 25 points and Green 19.

4-H Leader Training Held

Morrow county 4-H leaders met with agents Esther Kirnla and Joe Hay on Saturday, Dec. 3, at the Heppner fair annex building to wise-up on 4-H record keeping.

Leaders were given specific problems which involved the filling out of individual 4-H records, permanent record sheets, and 4-H story.

The film, "From Ten to Twelve" was viewed by the group. It dealt with the understanding of boys and girls.

Mrs. L. A. McCabe, chairman of the record keeping committee, announced the "4-H Record Book Contest" for the year.

Its purpose is to encourage 4-H members to complete their 4-H records at the close of the year. The 4-H leader's council of Morrow county are announcing a 4-H record book contest.

Cash awards will be given at the close of the year at the annual 4-H Achievement parties.

Basics For Judging Record Books: Completeness: 30 points. All totals should be carried to correct columns. If more than one project is carried, member should indicate on each record sheet to which project the 4-H story is attached.

Neatness: 30 points. Use either pen or pencil throughout. Don't use both. Suggest that member use scratch sheets during the year and copy on clean record at close of the year.

Accuracy: 20 points. All totals complete. List all activities including premiums won at all fairs.

Story: 20 points. Originality. Limit story length to 500 words. Must be hand written. Only one story, covering all 4-H projects carried that year, is submitted.

Suggestions: As it is the leader's responsibility that each member complete his 4-H records at the close of the year, the record keeping committee suggests...

Leader hold a meeting soon after the fairs to help club member complete his record books. (Including activities such as 4-H camp, summer school, demonstrations, judging, and fair awards and ribbons.)

Farmers-For-Kennedy Meet In Reno

Mr. and Mrs. Orville Cutsforth were among the four members of the Farmers for Kennedy group to make a trip to Reno recently to attend a planning meeting on farm legislation.

Cutsforth said the goal of the group is to cut the budget for the Department of Agriculture by 50 per cent.

Discussed were the possibility of commodity groups controlling their own production to take the place of government controls. Economy and economical administration of the agriculture program were stressed.

It was recommended that under-secretaries of agriculture should come from various phases of agriculture and requested that one wheat man, one cattleman and one from diversified crop farming be included.

All recommendations of the group fall within the farm program outlined by Kennedy before his election, Cutsforth said.

Attending the three-day session with the Cutsforths were Mr. and Mrs. Jim Barnett, Pendleton, and state senator Loyd Key, Milton-Freewater, and Mrs. Key.
