Mustangs Take Two Thrillers from Highlanders

Coach Clint Agee's Mustangs pulled two more victories out of the fire last weekend by squeezing by the Burns Highlanders twice. Friday 54 to 53 and Saturday night 58 to 56. Heppner was headed by Ron Gray who scored 42 points for the weekend's play.

Both nights Burns put on a last period rally that made the Heppner team fight to keep ahead. Friday night the Highlanders came on with 23 points in the fourth quarter to put the Mustangs behind but were able to work themselves back up and in the last seconds Gray sunk a free throw that pulled the Mustangs out.

Friday night things started off quietly with both teams finding it difficult to get in shooting position in the first period. In the second stanza Heppner opened up by getting eight more points on the score board before the Burns squad scored. In the first part of the period, Larry Tibbles and Tom Green found the secret to keeping Burns big 6' 6" center, Lee Larson, off the boards and Heppner gained control.

At half time Heppner had a commanding lead of thirteen points, 31 to 18.

In the third quarter, Heppner again extended its lead with the aid of Bruce Moyer and Ron Gray who were hitting from the outside.

The fourth period saw things change hands fast. Burns scored ten points before the Mustangs knew what had happened. Darryl Womack and Cal Mosley started hitting from the sides, drawing the Heppner defense off and allowing Larson to regain control of the boards.

In the closing seconds of the game Heppner was down two points when Gray brought the ball down court and shot from about 25 feet out and got fouled, giving him a shot at the charity line. He made the shot and as Burns took the ball out the gun sounded.

Saturday night Heppner was again led by Gray who scored

24 points with the biggest majority from the outside.

Both teams took it easy again in the first quarter with the score being tied at the end of the first period 11 to 11.

In the second stanza, Heppner and Burns stayed neck and neck with Burns scoring two points in the closing seconds to take the lead at half time 23 to 21.

The third quarter saw Heppner fight back with the help of Tom Green and Larry Tibbles and at the end of the period was again ahead by one point. In the early part of the final period, Heppner was having its problems with Sonny Biddle fouling out, who was helping control the backboards.

With 1:45 seconds to go in the game Gale Merseth, Burns, sunk a field goal that put the Heppner team behind by five points. Gray brought the ball down court, passed to the corner to Tibbles who sunk it. Burns tried to stall, but as the night before, it backfired with Heppner regaining control of the ball. Gray stole the ball and again shot from about 25 feet out. With 20 seconds to go, Moyer picked off a Highlander pass and with 5 seconds left, Gray shot again to put Heppner one point ahead with Green going to the charity line to sink his first one but missing the second one as the clock ran out.

This weekend, Heppner will host the Grant Union Prospectors from John Day for a two night stand.
