In 1965 Bishop Phillips Brooks, a young rector in Philadelphia went abroad for a year of travel and to make a pilgrimage to Palestine. On Christmas Eve he rode on horseback from Jerusalem to Bethlehem and visited not only the usual sights in the village, but went down to the traditional field of the shepherds. He visited the field where they say the shepherds saw the star. Also the site of the Nativity.

With these experiences in mind, young Brooks returned to Philadelphia and wrote for a Sunday school Christmas celebration the exquisite lyric, O, Little Town of Bethlehem. The music was composed by Brooks' organist and superintendent of the school.
