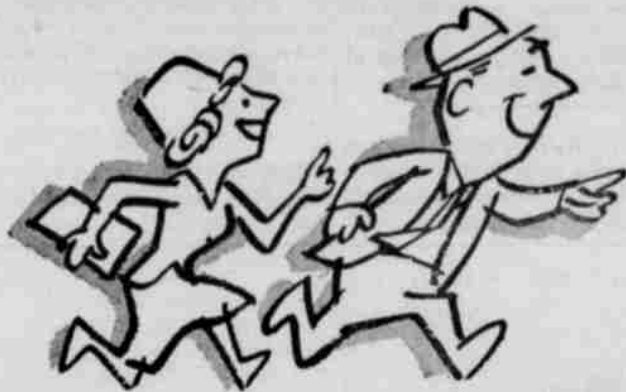
Eighth Grade Party At Valentine Home

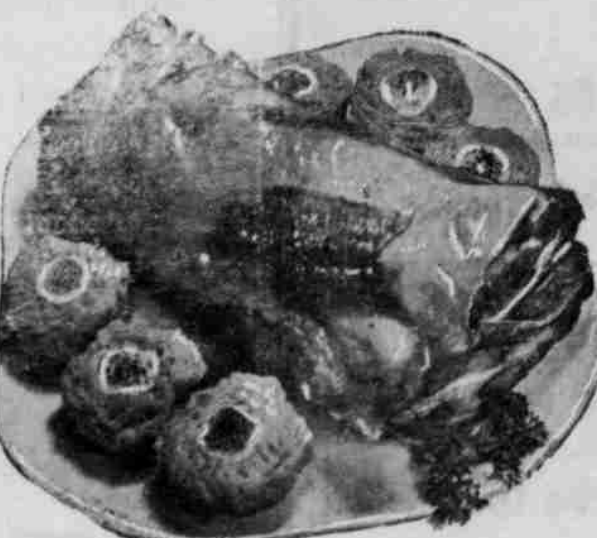
