## From The County Agent's Office

A correction is made to the news item appearing in this column last week concerning lambs available from the Don Greenup Ranch as 4-H club projects. For a good many years now, there has been a demand for lambs for 4-H boys and girls to feed out for show and sales. Many of these boys and girls, for some reason or another, cannot or do not raise their own lambs. It is difficult for them to go out and buy a lamb unless they have the ewe to go with it and raise the lamb. Since Don has realized that this is a problem for 4-H boys and girls he has offered to sell to these boys and girls a lamb letting them take the ewe so that they can have the benefit of raising the lamb as easily as possible. Generally these lambs can be weaned at around three months of age as they get on full creep feed. The ewe can then be returned. The story, as it appeared last week indicated that Don would give these boys and girls the lamb for taking care of the ewe.

Wilbur Van Biokland, at Wright ranch, was very happy with the results for both lice and grub control. A check will be made on the next "hatch" of grubs to determine if these were affected as well as the first ones.

Announcement was made this week of five sheep shearing schools of two day duration which will be held throughout Oregon this spring. We are calling attention of these schools because there has been interest and participation by some of our young men in past years. Three of these shearing schools will be held in Corvallis, the third full week in March. Sixteen students can be accommodated for each of these three schools. The next shearing school will be held in Grants Pass on March 29 and 30. The last will be held in Union County, April 5 and 6.

Herb Ekstrom & Sons, Ione, should have the congratulations of all cattlemen of this area. The honor that they brought to Oregon by having two polled Hereford heifers, one judged Grand Champion, the other high in its class, at the National Western Livestock Show is a feather in the cap of anyone. It is especially so that young breeders like the Ekstroms should capture this coveted prize. For those who have attended the National Western Livestock Show at Denver, they know that it is the largest Hereford show in the country. Competition is keen. While we are not going to say much more in this column about this honor, since it is a headline news story we do know that it has focused a lot of attention on this herd and already there are many inquiries from other

stains about the herd and the breeding stock available for sale. Morrow County Livestock men will further realize that they do not have to leave the county to get the best available breeding stock. There will be more of these kind since Prince Husker, the sire of these two fancy heifers, is in the prime of his life. The dams of these two heifers and many more like them are found in the herd.

The Ekstroms as well as Don Robinson of Kirk & Robinson, Heppner, are exhibiting this week at the Columbia Empire Polled Hereford Show & Sale at Walla Walla. Herb has consigned a Prince Husker Domino bull, while Don Robinson has consigned four bulls and two heifers sired by his Gold Connel, Anda Bull, By Brumode. The Ekstroms will leave immediately after returning from the Columbia Empire Show & Sale at Red Bluff, Calif., where they have consigned two Mill Iron and Two Husker Mischief bulls.

Ray Doiven, Lexington, while visiting the office the other day told us of an interesting experience he had with raising catfish in a small spring on his ranch. It seems he picked up about 60 young catfish a couple of years ago and dropped them in the spring. He was going to see how they would grow and have a little fishing right at home. Last spring, one day while inspecting the spring, he found floating on the spring some jelly

like wiggling masses about the size of a baseball. On closer inspection he found they were catfish eggs, "wrigglers" or whatever little catfish are called. Later when it looked like there would be too many catfish for the spring Ray took these to Sand Hollow and put them in a small pond that he had built there. There were so many of them they couldn't be counted. Later in the summer when the pond in Sand Hollow dried up he gathered 274 half-grown catfish and took them back to the spring. It sounds like the "Doiven Catfish Farm" is doing quite well.

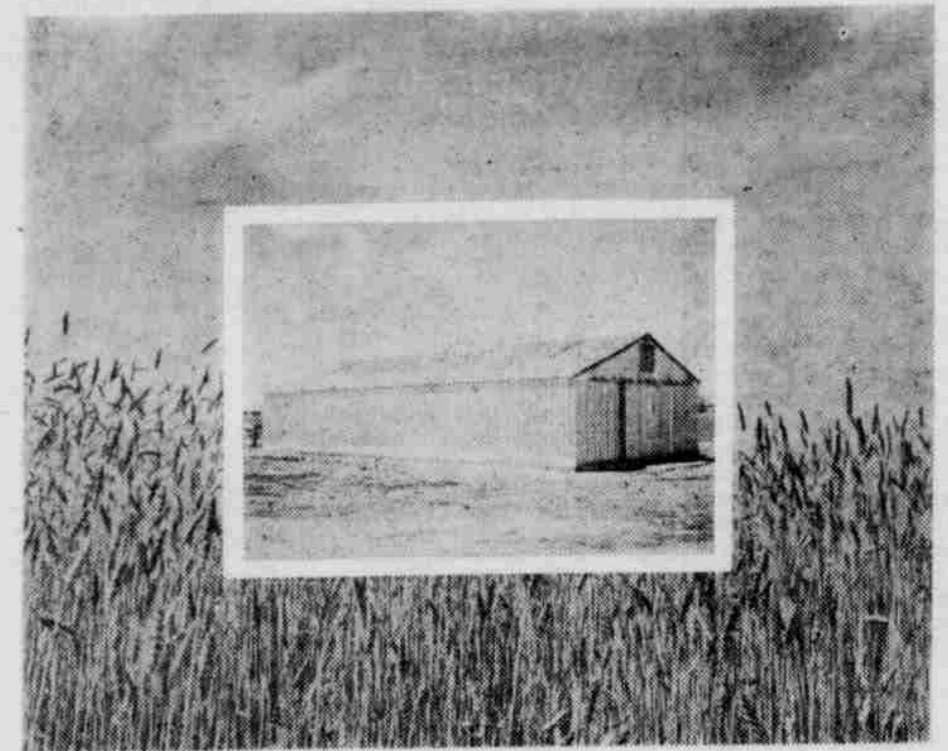

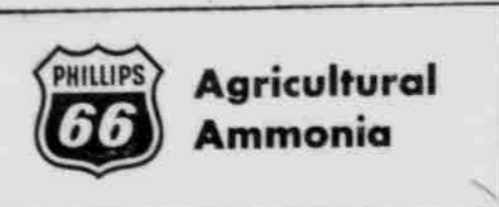
