THIS IS YOUR HOSPITAL

This is one of a series written by the administrator of Pioneer Memorial Hospital, and published by the Gazette-Times as a public service.

It has often been said that rules are made to be broken. In your hospital a better saying would be, "Rules are made for a reason."

We have about the normal number of rules and regulations and, I suppose, about the normal number of complaints about them. The one thing that makes this hospital different from most hospitals is the type of community we live in. It is quite common to have two, three, or even more patients in the hospital who are related either by blood or marriage. It can be quite a gathering of the clan, when all of the relatives decide to come visit at the same time.

We have a little pamphlet about the hospital that is available to all visitors and patients. The following regulations on visiting are from that pamphlet.

Visiting hours in the hospital are: 2:00 to 4:00 p.m., and 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. Maternity, 2:30 to 4:00 p.m., and 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. It is requested that you do not bring children under 16 years of age to visit patients. The prevalence of communicable diseases among children, with the consequent danger of infection, makes this regulation of the State Board of Health essential.

Visiting regulations are necessary if you are to receive the rest and care you need in the hospital. Lengthy visits are exhausting to the patient and the presence of more than two persons at a time is particularly tiring. Therefore, visitors are asked to make their visits short and pleasant. Loud conversation and unnecessary noise in rooms and in the corridors is annoying and

detrimental to the recovery of patients. Visitors are neither to sit nor place their clothing upon the bed of a patient. No visitors are allowed in surgery, the recovery room or the emergency room.

Patients going to surgery may see the immediate family for a few minutes before surgery. No visitors will be allowed in the recovery room. After surgery visitors will be allowed in the patient's room for a few minutes. It is much better for the patient and hastens his recovery if visitors are kept at a minimum immediately following surgery. Visitors will not be allowed to stay all night with relatives unless the patient is on the critical list.

For the protection of maternity patients, visitors are asked not to visit other patients and then go see maternity patients.

Please do not bring food or liquids from outside to any patient. All patients are placed on a diet by their doctor. The diet depends on the patient's condition and, usually, is part of the treatment.

The patient's prime purpose in coming to the hospital has been to get well. It is unfair to the patient and the hospital to wander in and out, visiting at all hours of the day. The patient does not get his proper rest and the hospital is unable to give the patient adequate care when visitors are present continually.

You are asked to limit the number of visitors per patient to two. If the patient you are visiting requests that you do something for him, ask the nurse first, especially if you have any doubts about the consequences of your doing the chore.

If the reasons are sufficient, these regulations can be bent a little but—ask first!

In a later article I will write about visiting the nursing home patients.

Grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Roy Cross of Hillsboro, Oregon and Mr. and Mrs. Orin Huston of Heppner.

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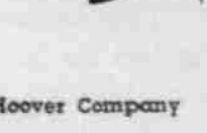
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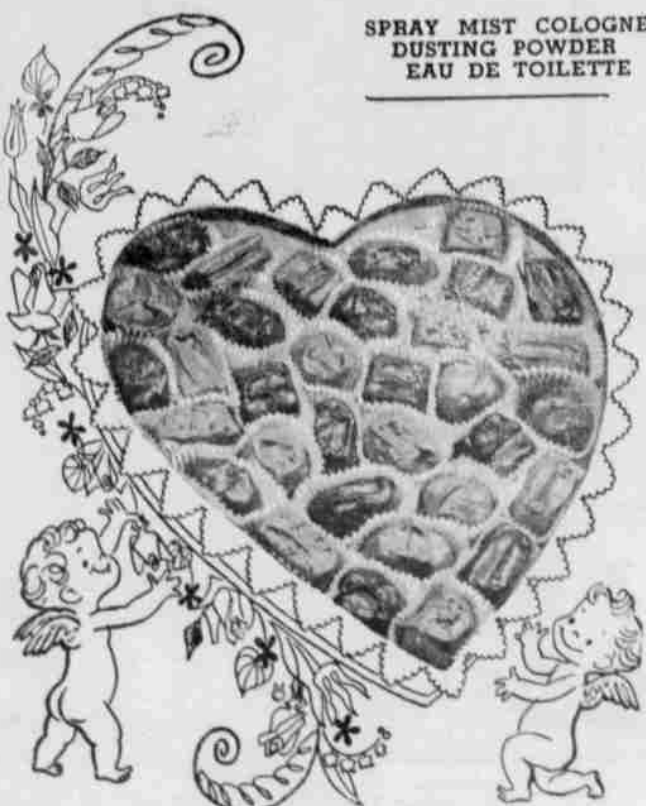
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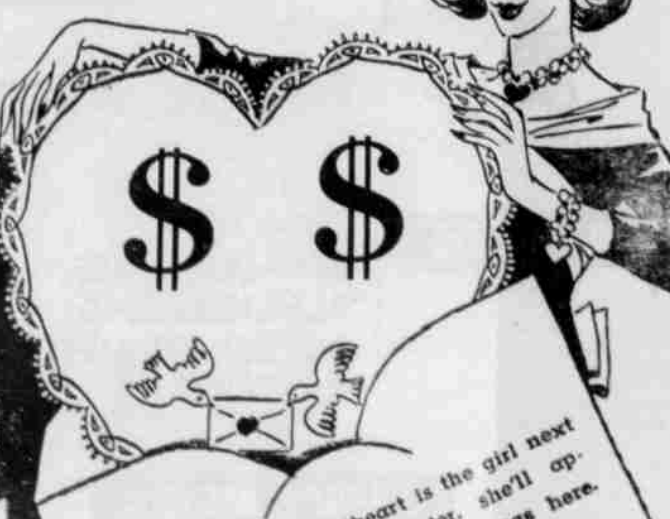
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
