REVIEW OF NEW BOOKS IN IONE PUBLIC LIBRARY

THE JUSTICER, a novel by Thomas Fall, Kansas, in 1889, was still uncomfortably close to its violent past. The legacies of decades of bloodshed were suspicion and prejudice which, when unscrupulously manipulated, formed the cornerstones of many a political career. Judge Ring was just such a manipulator of public opinion and he brought almost the entire town of Ridgefield along with him in his fierce pursuit of "justice." It was a newcomer to town, young lawyer Angus DeWolfe, who first openly pointed out that the "justice" of Judge Ring inevitably meant a death sentence for any Indian unlucky enough to stand before his bench. A young Indian client charged with murder gave the lawyer his test case, and as the idealist and tyrant moved toward the unavoidable clash, DeWolfe found an unexpected ally in the Judge's schoolteacher daughter. Climax of this exciting novel is a courtroom scene that is brilliant drama. The life of a man is at stake, and the tragedy of his situation—that another man's unreasoned hatred can use the law to kill—gives meaning and power to this bold scene.

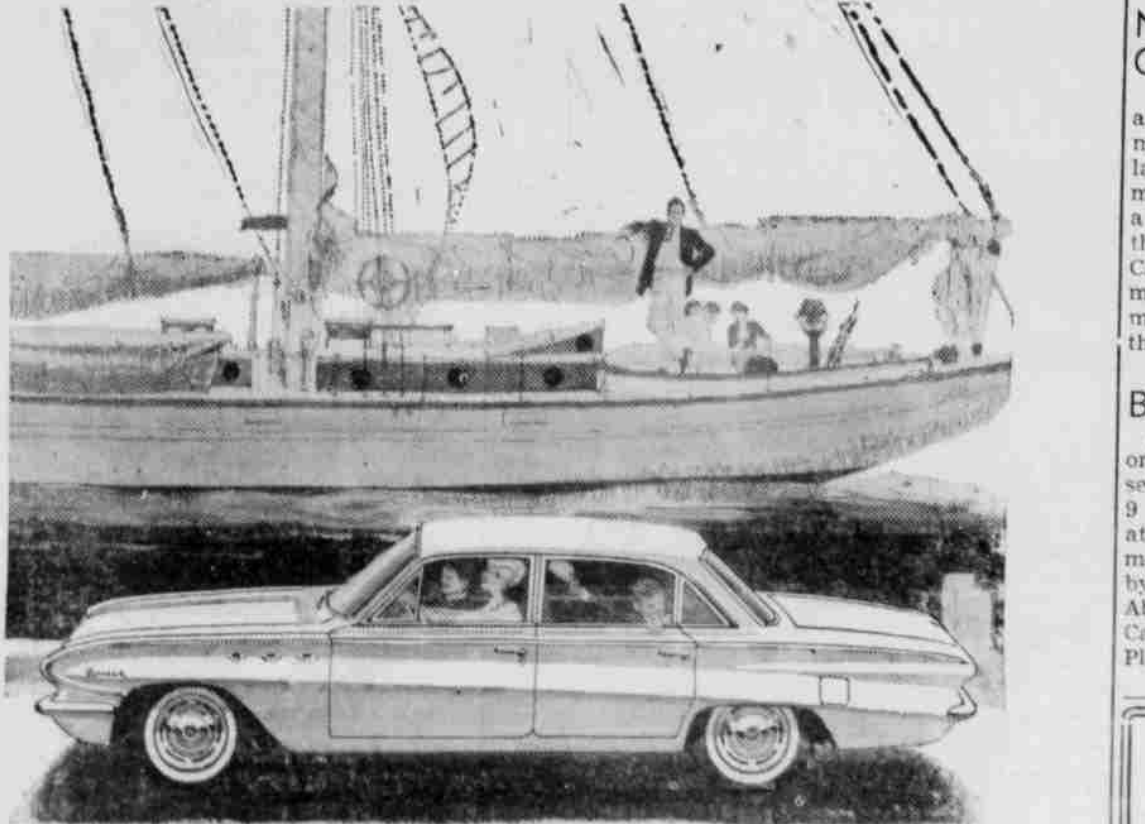
