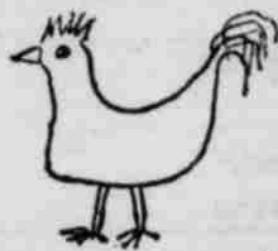
Mrs. Kenneth Wooten had surgery on her foot at Good Shepherd Hospital in Hermiston last Friday, returning to her home Saturday.

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Heppner Quintet Breaks Long Losing Streak

Coach Clint Agee's Heppner High Mustangs finally came to life after losing nine straight games.

Saturday night the Heppner cage squad played its best game of the year as they dumped Burns Hilanders 75 to 45. Friday night the Heppner team took a spill as the visitors took the close and hard fought game 52 to 46.

Friday night the game started off slow with Heppner trailing at the end of the first period by one point, 9 to 8. Tom Green, Heppner senior center, scored all of the Heppner eight points.

In the second stanza both teams again were taking it easy as neither team could find the range of the basket. Larry Tibbles won praise from everybody for the fine job of defending big 6'6" center Lee Larson and holding him to only 9 points in the first half and netting 15 for the game.

At half time Heppner was trailing 21 to 19.

After the intermission both teams came back to play a neck and neck ball game. In the third period both teams got 15 points each with Gale Merseth of Burns doing most of their scoring.

In the final quarter Heppner went down hill just enough to give the game to Burns. Burns came up with 16 points and Heppner got 12. Ron Gray, Bruce Moyer and Green kept the Heppner team alive in the last half but just could not manage to get ahead.

Saturday night the Mustang team won praise from Coach Agee and he stated "the best game the boys have played all year."

The first half of the game was somewhat like the game the night before. In the first half the game was tight with only one point separating either team most of the time. At the end of the first quarter, Heppner was behind by one point 14-13.

In the second quarter Heppner fought back to take the lead at the end of the half by one point this time 29 to 28. Tom Green and Nat Webb kept the Heppner team in the game in the first half as they tallied 18 of the Heppner points.

In the third period Heppner came out full of fire and ready to go. In the last half Larry Tibbles and Ron Gray were the boys who pulled the team out. Between the two they tallied 25 points.

The third quarter the Heppner team racked up 22 points and Burns got 14 more. The final stanza was the biggest quarter for the Heppner team all year. They held the Hilanders to only three points and those all came from the charity line. Heppner this time got 24 points with all the players getting the range. All of the Heppner team except one made the scoring column.

This week end Heppner will take on the league champions, the Madras White Buffaloes on the Madras court. This is the last series for the 1960-61 Mustang season.
