From The County Agent's Office

For those who have asked about the recommendation made by Dean Swan at our annual weed meeting relative to selective spraying of wheat I quote from my news release of Feb. 16. "In visiting about the economic importance of spraying wheat selectively for the control of broad leaf plants the recommendation of three-quarters to one and one-half pounds of Ester type 2,4-D is again recommended for 1961. Research at the Pendleton Branch Experiment Station has found that two tarweeds per square foot can reduce wheat yields as much as five bushels per acre. It is important to spray with even as few weeds as this; however, experiments show that spraying wheat with no weeds at all could result in a two to five bushel DECREASE."

The question that came up was in regard to the decrease in wheat yields that could result in spraying where there were no weeds at all. Experiments have been carried out during the past several years and contrary to some people's thinking 2,4-D does not cause wheat to yield

more bushels per acre. These experiments have shown that it reacts in the opposite manner, causing decrease.

Early spring sprays (delayed dormant) are required for the control of some diseases of several small fruits. With the weather as we have had it during the last few days these sprays should be applied soon. For leaf and cane spot on trailing berries spray with lime sulphur between March 10 to 15. Use 1 gallon of lime sulphur per ten gallons of water. Two weeks later spray with a fixed copper 1/2 pound per 8 gallons water or captan, 2 1/2 oz. per 10 gallons of water. For yellow rust on red raspberries spray with lime sulphur 1/2 gallons per 12 gallons of water at the green tip stage, two weeks later spray with lime sulphur 1/2 gallon per 10 gallons water. For powdery mildew on gooseberry spray with lime sulphur, 1/2 gallon per 12 gallons of water at the green tip stage. Many of our small fruits are in the green tip stage now which means that they are showing green leaves at the tip of the branches. Follow application directions on the container.

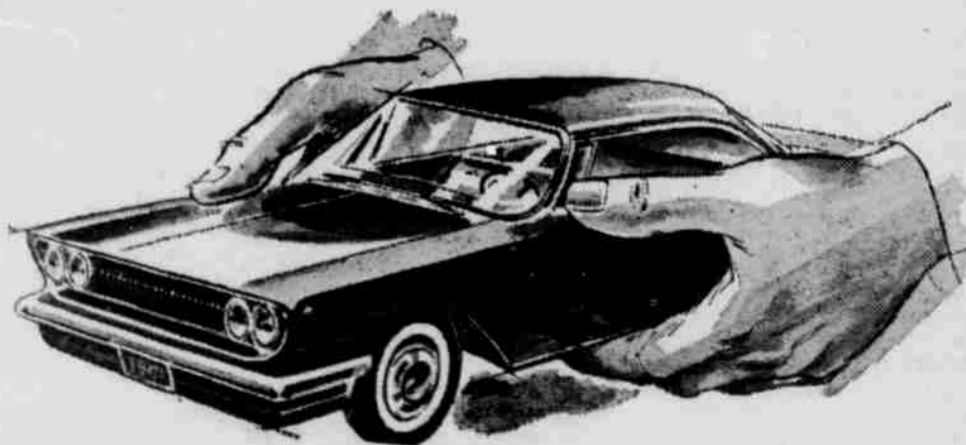
