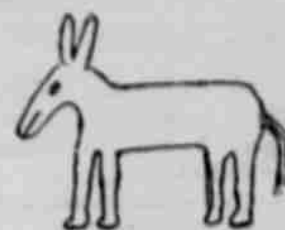
Members continued the study of livestock judging.
