Williams To Teach At University Of Kansas

An assistant professorship at the school of education in the University of Kansas has been given Clifford Williams, seventh and eighth grade teacher at Heppner elementary school. Besides his duties as instructor, Williams will be working toward his ME degree. Mrs. Williams, who also teaches at the Heppner school, will be working toward her BA degree, majoring in education.

Williams said that they expected to be in residence at the University for a minimum of two years.

The family came here from Kellogg, Idaho, two years ago. Last summer Williams attended the University of Kansas on a National Science Foundation grant. He has taught eighth grade science during his stay here.

"Part of Mr. Williams' recognition is due to the fact that he did such outstanding work in the fields of science and social studies in his two years in the Heppner schools," Robert Van Houtte, administrator, said.

Williams has taken an active part in public affairs and has served as vice president of Heppner PTA, and chairman of the membership committee while on the local faculty. He is a graduate of North Idaho College and has also done graduate work at Eastern Washington. Mrs. Williams is a graduate of Lewiston Clark Normal School in Idaho.

Donald Frederickson Dies From Accident

An accident at Kinzua Corporation planer mill last Friday at 2 p.m. resulted in the death 12 hours later of Donald L. Frederickson, 41.

He was struck on the right temple by a board, causing considerable hemorrhage, shock and cerebral concussion. He was brought to Pioneer Memorial hospital by ambulance where a desperate attempt was made to save his life.

Equipment for surgery and specialists from Pendleton and Pasco were flown in.

Mr. Frederickson was born Nov. 4, 1920, at Lexington and lived in this area all his life except for four years in the service with the U. S. Army Air Corps, 1942 to 1946. He was commander of the American Legion here at the time of his death. He was also a member of Heppner Elks lodge.

Services were held Monday at 2 p.m. at the Christian church, the Rev. Charles Knox officiating.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. at the Christian church, the Rev. Charles Knox officiating. Burial was in Heppner Masonic cemetery.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Veri Frederickson, Heppner.

State Planner Meets With Court And Commission

Members of the Morrow County Planning Commission and the county court met with Lloyd Anderson, Portland, planning chief of the State Department of Planning and Development at the county courthouse Wednesday afternoon.

Anderson outlined methods of putting into effect county zoning and said there were two ways in which it can be done without a vote of the people.

An interim ordinance can be adopted for a three-year period by the county court. This can be followed by a three-year temporary ordinance, or the temporary ordinance can be put in first. A temporary ordinance can become permanent after three years unless 15 per cent of the people affected petition for a public vote. The remaining method is by vote.

Subdivision regulations and a county building code can be adopted by action of the county court without further authorization, he said.

The meeting was called to brief the local officials on their powers in case of sudden influx of people in the county.

The planning commission and the court indicated that no action along this line would be taken at this time but plans would be laid for use in case they were needed.

Mayor Al Lamb has proclaimed March 14 as "Cancer Alertness Day" in Heppner to call attention to the American Cancer Society's mass public showings of its film on uterine cancer, "Time and Two Women."

Many Subjects Are Considered By City Fathers

A decision to not start duplication of facilities within the city was given as reason by the City Council Monday night in denying an application for a franchise to Columbia Basin Electric Co-op.

Harley Young, manager of the Co-op, requested the franchise so that the company could bid on electric service for the new Heppner-Lexington high school plant which is to be built on property partly outside the city limits.

In other business, discussion was held of sidewalks on the city streets which are in bad repair and the city recorder was instructed to send letters to the owners.

A report was given that new wire had been placed around the city dump, but trash still blew in the strong winds Sunday. It was stated that more wire was on hand and would be put in place to cut down the blowing. Possibility of obtaining a better street sweeper was discussed. Victor Groshens, water commissioner, said that the 20-year-old machine could not be repaired without great expense.

Groshens was authorized to purchase 35 to 40 more loads of gravel to be used by the city crews in street repairs. He reports that the water line for the new school has been laid to school property on Morgan street. The line will be extended when the street commission accepts the school road as meeting required standards.

One local FFA boy will determine if he is to receive a scholarship, one will serve on a committee to select a state winner, and the Heppner agricultural instructor will be installed in office during the four-day Future Farmers of America state convention in Salem March 15-18.

Bill Monagle, senior, has applied for the Union Pacific scholarship which can be used for study of agriculture at any college or university in the UP service area. The winner will be announced at this convention.

Lew Robbins, Heppner ag instructor, has been appointed as Blue Mountain district FFA adviser for a two-year term and will be installed in office with the rest of the new state officers on Saturday. Blue Mountain is one of 10 districts in the state.

Jerry Anderson, another senior at Heppner high, will serve on the soil, water, and forestry committee at the convention to select the top boy in the state who has participated in the activities in soil, water and forestry management during the last year.

Monagle and Anderson are the official delegates of the local chapter. They will represent the chapter at the meetings planning activities and requirements for awards of FFA on a state basis for next year.

Others going along who will serve as alternates to represent the Heppner chapter are William Rill, John Cleveland and Kenneth Wright.

Huggett To Do Graduate Work At U. Of Michigan

Marion C. Huggett, who has served as math and science teacher at Heppner high school since 1953, has received an appointment for a year's graduate study at the University of Michigan. The grant is for the academic year 1961-62 and is made by the National Science Foundation. It includes a stipend for living allowances for him and his wife and family of four children.

Huggett is a graduate of Lewis & Clark College, Portland, 1946, and received his MA there in 1948. He attended summer school at Central College, Ellensburg, Wash., in 1959, and last summer attended the University of California at Berkeley on a National Science Foundation scholarship. He has majored in science and mathematics.

He has been successful as a coach during his stay here, having coached the grade school basketball team his first year, junior varsity team two years, and this year he coached the first freshman basketball team organized in the high school. The frosh had an impressive record of eight wins and two losses for their first year as a team.

School authorities said that there had been a remarkable growth in the science department under Huggett's instruction and that he would be greatly missed on the faculty.

Instructor Huggett said that he and his family would be leaving sometime after school is out for their new location.

Feed Grain Survey Now In Progress

A survey of all farms in Morrow county which produce feed grains is under way at this time.

The survey is being made thruout the major feed grain producing areas which includes Morrow county, as an advance step in connection with proposed feed grain programs now under discussion. The proposals would include adjusting the 1961 acreages of corn and other feed grains.

To put such a program into operation for 1961 crops in a manner which would be fair to all growers, accurate data must be obtained immediately for the possible establishment of feed grain base acreages for all farms in the major feed grain producing areas. Such information will include the acreage history of corn, grain sorghum, barley, and oats, as well as the acreage devoted to other crops and land uses, for all farms in the area where one or more of these feed grains were produced within the past two years.

It is the intention, as far as possible, for some employee in the county office to interview each farm operator or owner whose farm has produced feed grains either in 1959 or 1960.

Bids Called For Bull Prairie Dam Construction

The Oregon State Game Commission has issued a call for bids for construction of an earth fill dam on Wilson creek in Grant county. The dam will create a lake of approximately 25 surface acres at the Bull Prairie guard station.

Located about 35 miles south of Heppner on Highway 207 and only two miles off the main highway, the new lake will provide another recreation spot in the area. Swimming, boating and fishing will be available to the public on this man-made lake.

Construction is being done by the State Game Commission. The U. S. Bureau of Fisheries and Wildlife is assisting the Game Commission in financing thru taxes on fishing equipment sales. The U. S. Forest Service is co-operating with clearing of the area and construction of picnic tables, sanitary facilities and docks for boats.

Bids will be opened at the Portland office March 20 with construction expected soon after.

Ione Cardinals, coached by "Chuck" Hudson, won the District 7-B title and a trip to the state tournament at Bend, Mar. 9-11, in a thriller that took two overtime periods in downing Weston 52-50.

This was Weston's first loss of the season, as they had won 23 straight games.

The Cardinals and Tigers gave a capacity crowd at the Pendleton Armory the kind of battle

they had paid to see, as the lead changed with practically every basket in the first half.

Weston took a six point lead midway through the third period and held a slim lead until the closing seconds of the ball game. Weston, leading by 5 points 48-43 with 57 seconds to go, tried protecting their lead but an interception by Ione cut the lead to 48-45 as Swanson scored.

Weston fouled Crabtree of Ione with 11 seconds to go, giving Ione a one and one situation. The first shot was good for a 48-46 tally. Ione called a time out. Ron's second shot rebounded high with Ione getting possession. Swanson scored the tying two points as time ran out, ending 48-48. Bedlam broke out in the stands.

Ione and Weston scored two points apiece as the first three-minute overtime ticked by, ending it 50-48.

This called for a "sudden death" overtime which ended quickly. Swanson tipped to Crabtree with a pass back to Swanson for the winning two points and the 7-B tournament championship. Swanson was high point man with 20.

Dallas Shockley, superintendent of Ione schools and the District 7-B tournament chairman, introduced Louis Knorr, of Spray, of the tournament committee who in turn presented the championship trophy to Francis Rea. Second place Weston received a trophy from Mr. Knorr and it was presented to Allyn Lieualien. Mr. Shockley presented the consolation award to Pilot Rock.
